| immensely | To a great extent; extremely. <i>Was immensely more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i> |
| incalculable | (of a person or their character) unpredictable. <i>Incalculable riches.</i> |

| plenty | A full supply. <i>She has plenty more ideas.</i> |
| really | Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They re not really my aunt and uncle.</i> |
| substantially | In a strong substantial way. <i>The price went up substantially.</i> |
| therefore | From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion therefore adv as a consequence. <i>He was injured and therefore unable to play.</i> |
