- Fly a plane without an engine.








### Synonyms of "Soar" as a verb (21 Words)

<u>drift</u>	Cause to be carried by a current. People began to <b>drift</b> away.
<u>escalate</u>	Make or become more intense or serious. We do not want to <b>escalate</b> the war.
<u>float</u>	Convert from a fixed point notation to a floating point notation. Clouds <b>float</b> ed across a brilliant blue sky.
fly up	Run away quickly.
<u>glide</u>	Fly in or as if in a glider plane. <i>Students learning to <b>glide</b>.</i>
hang	Kill by hanging. It kept <b>hang</b> ing my computer.
hang glide	Let drop or droop.
<u>hover</u>	Hang over, as of something threatening, dark, or menacing. <i>Her hand <b>hover</b>ed over the console.</i>
increase rapidly	v Make bigger or more.
<u>plane</u>	Make even or smooth with or as with a carpenter s plane. <i>Plane</i> the top of the door.
rise rapidly	Become heartened or elated.
sailplane	Fly a plane without an engine.
shoot up	Hit with a missile from a weapon.
soar up	Fly a plane without an engine.
soar upwards	Rise rapidly.
spiral upwards	Move in a spiral or zigzag course.
<u>surge</u>	Increase suddenly and powerfully. The journalists <b>surge</b> d forward.
wheel	Move along on or as if on wheels or a wheeled vehicle. <i>The birds</i> <b>wheel</b> ed and dived.
wing	Travel on wings or by aircraft fly. A little preparation puts you ahead of the job seekers who try to <b>wing</b> it.
wing its way	Travel through the air; be airborne.
<u>zoom</u>	Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. We watched the fly <b>zoom</b> ing around.

<u>climb</u>	The act of climbing something. <i>How old will these graduates be before they begin a long climb out of debt.</i>
<u>climbing</u>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>His other great interest was <b>climbing</b> especially in the Alps.</i>
<u>elevate</u>	Raise in rank or condition. The therapy can <b>elevate</b> serum amylase levels.
elevator	Lifting device consisting of a platform or cage that is raised and lowered mechanically in a vertical shaft in order to move people from one floor to another in a building. In the harbour a giant <b>elevator</b> stores prairie grain.
<u>escalate</u>	Make or become more intense or serious. We do not want to <b>escalate</b> the war.
<u>hike</u>	A sharp increase, especially in price. <i>Hike</i> the Rockies.
increase	The amount by which something increases. We are aiming to <b>increase</b> awareness of social issues.
<u>inflation</u>	The act of filling something with air. <i>Tax allowances and excise duties were increased in line with</i> <b>inflation</b> .
ladder	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. One of Sally s stockings developed a <b>ladder</b> .
lift	An act of lifting. The Puma tactical transport helicopter has a total <b>lift</b> of up to 5 500 lb.
mounting	The action of mounting something. The <b>mounting</b> of rapid fire guns.
<u>precipitate</u>	A precipitated solid substance in suspension or after settling or filtering. Wondered whether they had been rather <b>precipitate</b> in deposing the king.
promote	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. I got <b>promote</b> d after many years of hard work.
raise	Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. He had to <b>raise</b> his voice to make himself heard.
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. I gained the crest of a <b>rise</b> and saw the plain stretched out before me.



risen	Above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
<u>soaring</u>	The activity of flying a glider. The <b>soaring</b> spires of the cathedral.
stepladder	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.
<u>surge</u>	Increase suddenly and powerfully. <i>The boats <b>surge</b>d</i> .
<u>tenfold</u>	By ten times; to ten times the number or amount. A <b>tenfold</b> increase in the use of insecticides.
<u>up</u>	Used up. <b>Up</b> wardly mobile.
<u>upgrade</u>	A reservation that is improved. I got an <b>upgrade</b> to first class when coach class was full.
<u>upsurge</u>	A sudden or abrupt strong increase. An <b>upsurge</b> of emotion.
whizz	Move or go quickly. <i>A computer <b>whizz</b>.</i>
<u>zoom</u>	Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <b>Zoom</b> out for a wide view of the garden again.
