According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "sociable" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Willing to talk and engage in activities with other people; friendly.*
- *Friendly and pleasant.*
- *Inclined to or conducive to companionship with others.*
- *(of a place, occasion, or activity) characterized by friendliness or social interaction.*



Synonyms of "Sociable" as an adjective (10 Words)

- affable** Diffusing warmth and friendliness.
*An **affable** smile.*
- amicable** Characterized by friendliness and absence of discord.
*An **amicable** agreement.*
- clubbable** Suitable for membership of a club because of one's sociability or popularity.
*His social world was inhabited exclusively by **clubbable** men.*
- companionable** (of a situation) relaxed and pleasant because shared with friends or friendly people.
*A **companionable** pet.*
- convivial** (of an atmosphere or event) friendly, lively, and enjoyable.
*She was relaxed and **convivial**.*
- cordial** Warm and friendly.
***Cordial** relations.*

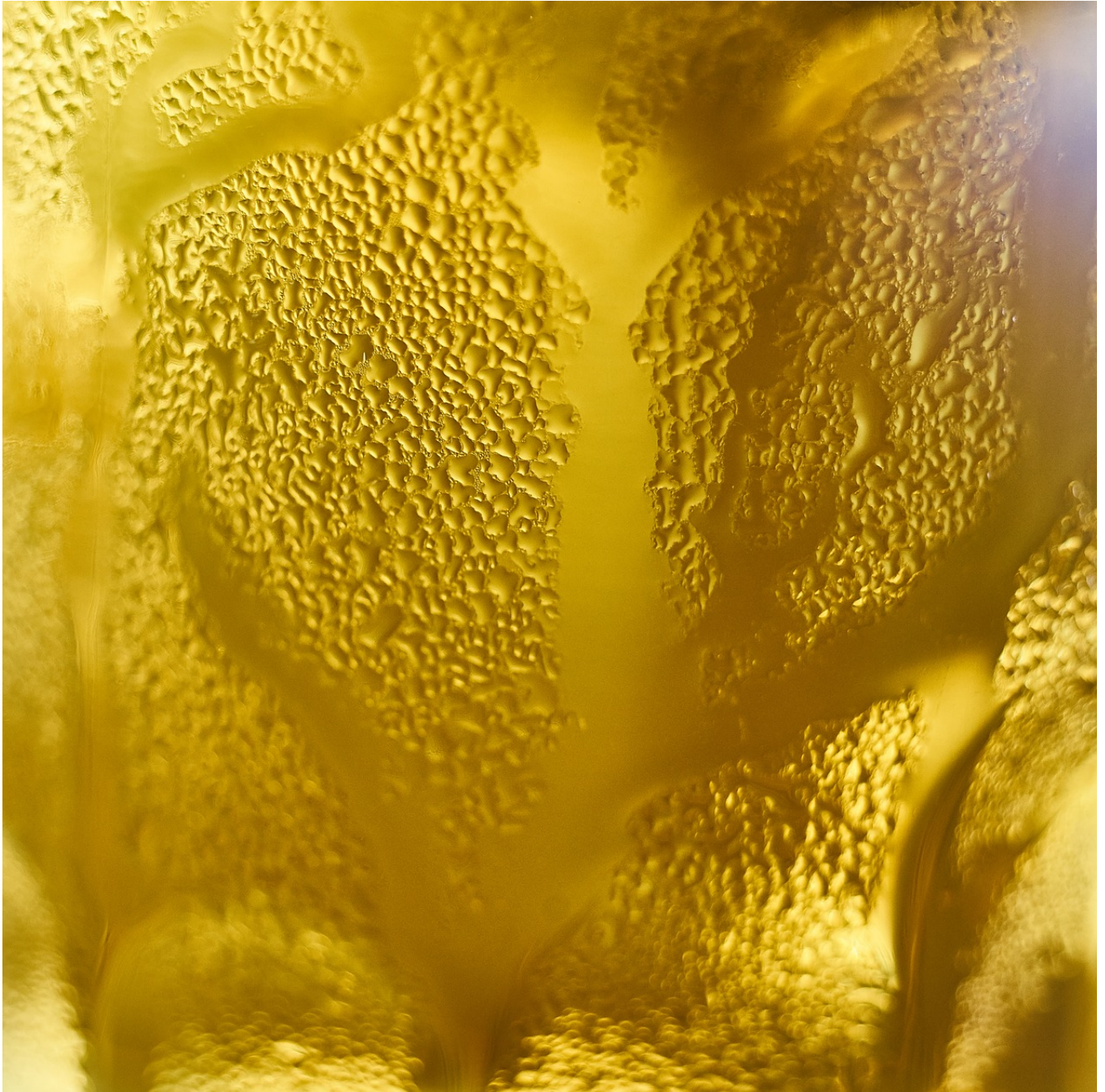
friendly	Easy to understand or use. <i>She gave me a friendly smile.</i>
gregarious	Growing in groups that are close together. <i>In the wild trees are usually gregarious plants.</i>
hospitable	Disposed to treat guests and strangers with cordiality and generosity. <i>A hospitable environment.</i>
neighbourly	Exhibiting the qualities expected in a friendly neighbor. <i>Shopping for the elderly is a regular feature of neighbourly support.</i>

Associations of "Sociable" (30 Words)

affable	Friendly, good-natured, or easy to talk to. <i>An affable smile.</i>
<u>amiable</u>	Having or displaying a friendly and pleasant manner. <i>The amiable young man greeted me enthusiastically.</i>
amicability	A disinclination to quarrel.
amicable	Characterized by friendship and good will. <i>The meeting was relatively amicable.</i>
bantering	Cleverly amusing in tone. <i>A bantering tone.</i>
<u>benign</u>	Not dangerous to health; not recurrent or progressive (especially of a tumor). <i>His benign but firm manner.</i>
<u>cheerful</u>	Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i>A cheerful room.</i>
companionable	Suggestive of companionship. <i>A companionable pet.</i>
complaisant	Willing to please others or to accept what they do or say without protest. <i>There are too many complaisant doctors signing sick notes.</i>
<u>congenial</u>	Capable of cross-fertilization or of being grafted. <i>His need for some congenial company.</i>
convivial	Occupied with or fond of the pleasures of good company. <i>She was relaxed and convivial.</i>
cordial	Warm and friendly. <i>Wine cups and fruit cordials.</i>
cordiality	A cordial disposition.
<u>courteous</u>	Polite, respectful, or considerate in manner. <i>A courteous young man.</i>
effluent	Water mixed with waste matter. <i>Contamination with trade effluents.</i>
entertainment	The action of providing or being provided with amusement or enjoyment. <i>A theatrical entertainment.</i>
extrovert	Relating to denoting or typical of an extrovert. <i>His extrovert personality made him the ideal host.</i>
extroverted	Not introspective; examining what is outside yourself. <i>She is extroverted confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
<u>favorable</u>	Occurring at a convenient or suitable time. <i>A favorable time to ask for a raise.</i>

friendly	Not seriously or unpleasantly competitive or divisive. <i>She gave me a friendly smile.</i>
genial	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>A genial host.</i>
gregarious	(of animals) living in flocks or loosely organized communities. <i>He is a gregarious person who avoids solitude.</i>
hearty	(of a person) strong and healthy. <i>A hearty and boisterous character.</i>
kindly	Please (used in a polite request or demand, often ironically). <i>Would you kindly explain what you re talking about.</i>
nice	Done with delicacy and skill. <i>Nice manners.</i>
obliging	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>One of the most obliging stewards.</i>
outgoing	A person's regular expenditure. <i>The inward deliveries and outgoings of raw materials.</i>
personality	Lively, engaging qualities. <i>She s always had loads of personality.</i>
pleasant	(of a person or their manner) friendly and considerate; likeable. <i>They found him pleasant and cooperative.</i>
talkative	Unwisely talking too much. <i>The talkative driver hadn t stopped chatting.</i>
