- *Willing to talk and engage in activities with other people; friendly.*
- *Friendly and pleasant.*
- *Inclined to or conducive to companionship with others.*
- *(of a place, occasion, or activity) characterized by friendliness or social interaction.*



## Synonyms of "Sociable" as an adjective (10 Words)

<b>affable</b>	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>An <b>affable</b> smile.</i>
<b>amicable</b>	Characterized by friendliness and absence of discord. <i>An <b>amicable</b> agreement.</i>
<b>clubbable</b>	Suitable for membership of a club because of one's sociability or popularity. <i>His social world was inhabited exclusively by <b>clubbable</b> men.</i>
<b>companionable</b>	(of a situation) relaxed and pleasant because shared with friends or friendly people. <i>A <b>companionable</b> pet.</i>
<b>convivial</b>	(of an atmosphere or event) friendly, lively, and enjoyable. <i>She was relaxed and <b>convivial</b>.</i>
<b>cordial</b>	Warm and friendly. <i><b>Cordial</b> relations.</i>



<b>friendly</b>	Easy to understand or use. <i>She gave me a <b>friendly</b> smile.</i>
<b>gregarious</b>	Growing in groups that are close together. <i>In the wild trees are usually <b>gregarious</b> plants.</i>
<b>hospitable</b>	Disposed to treat guests and strangers with cordiality and generosity. <i>A <b>hospitable</b> environment.</i>
<b>neighbourly</b>	Exhibiting the qualities expected in a friendly neighbor. <i>Shopping for the elderly is a regular feature of <b>neighbourly</b> support.</i>

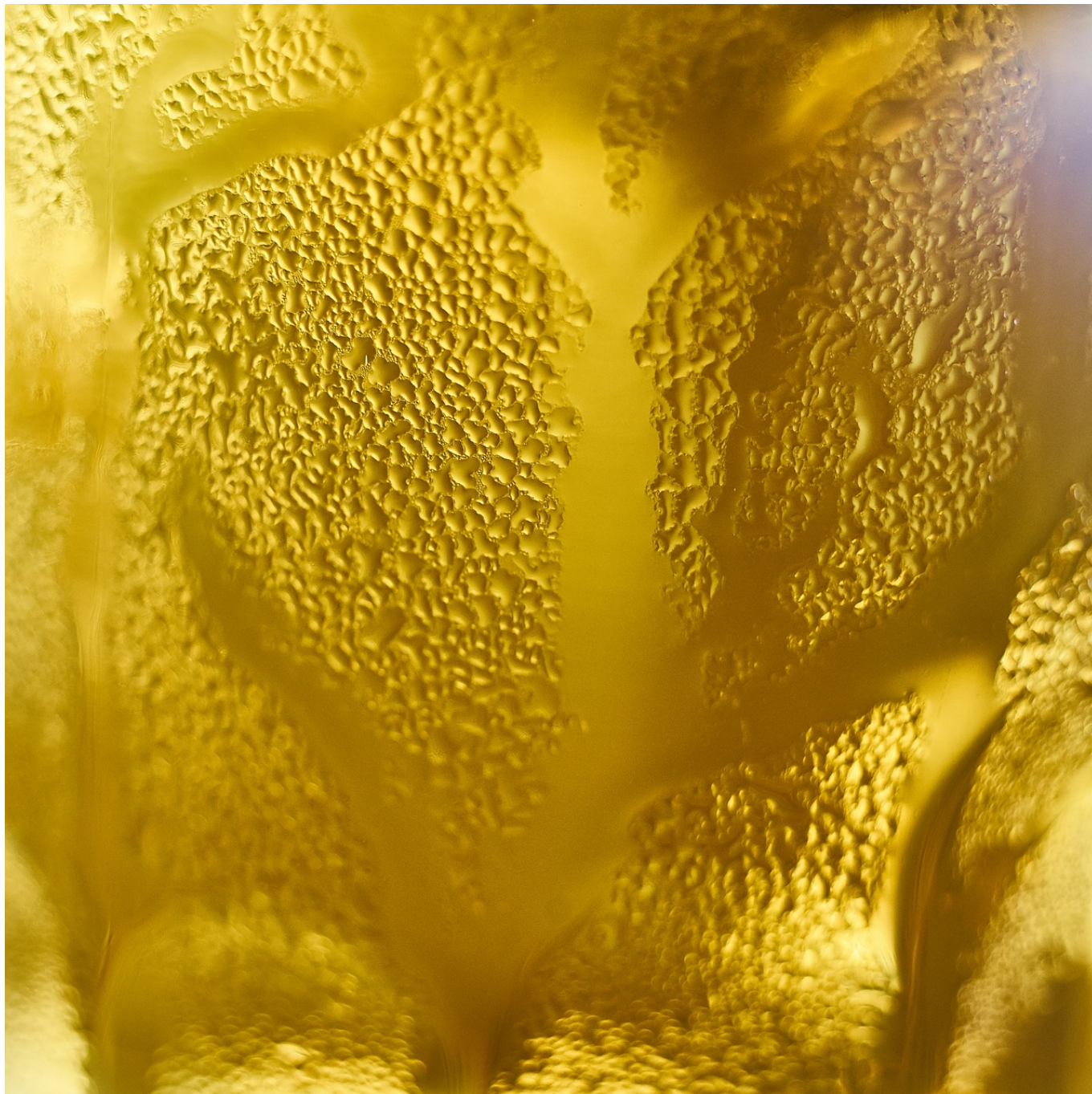

## **Associations of "Sociable" (30 Words)**

<b>affable</b>	Friendly, good-natured, or easy to talk to. <i>An <b>affable</b> smile.</i>
<u><b>amiable</b></u>	Having or displaying a friendly and pleasant manner. <i>The <b>amiable</b> young man greeted me enthusiastically.</i>
<b>amicability</b>	A disinclination to quarrel.
<b>amicable</b>	Characterized by friendship and good will. <i>The meeting was relatively <b>amicable</b>.</i>
<b>bantering</b>	Cleverly amusing in tone. <i>A <b>bantering</b> tone.</i>
<u><b>benign</b></u>	Not dangerous to health; not recurrent or progressive (especially of a tumor). <i>His <b>benign</b> but firm manner.</i>
<u><b>cheerful</b></u>	Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i>A <b>cheerful</b> room.</i>
<b>companionable</b>	Suggestive of companionship. <i>A <b>companionable</b> pet.</i>
<b>complaisant</b>	Willing to please others or to accept what they do or say without protest. <i>There are too many <b>complaisant</b> doctors signing sick notes.</i>
<u><b>congenial</b></u>	Capable of cross-fertilization or of being grafted. <i>His need for some <b>congenial</b> company.</i>
<b>convivial</b>	Occupied with or fond of the pleasures of good company. <i>She was relaxed and <b>convivial</b>.</i>
<b>cordial</b>	Warm and friendly. <i>Wine cups and fruit <b>cordials</b>.</i>
<b>cordiality</b>	A cordial disposition.
<u><b>courteous</b></u>	Polite, respectful, or considerate in manner. <i>A <b>courteous</b> young man.</i>
<b>effluent</b>	Water mixed with waste matter. <i>Contamination with trade <b>effluents</b>.</i>
<b>entertainment</b>	The action of providing or being provided with amusement or enjoyment. <i>A theatrical <b>entertainment</b>.</i>
<b>extrovert</b>	Relating to denoting or typical of an extrovert. <i>His <b>extrovert</b> personality made him the ideal host.</i>
<b>extroverted</b>	Not introspective; examining what is outside yourself. <i>She is <b>extroverted</b> confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
<u><b>favorable</b></u>	Occurring at a convenient or suitable time. <i>A <b>favorable</b> time to ask for a raise.</i>



<b>friendly</b>	Not seriously or unpleasantly competitive or divisive. <i>She gave me a <b>friendly</b> smile.</i>
<b>genial</b>	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>A <b>genial</b> host.</i>
<b>gregarious</b>	(of animals) living in flocks or loosely organized communities. <i>He is a <b>gregarious</b> person who avoids solitude.</i>
<b>hearty</b>	(of a person) strong and healthy. <i>A <b>hearty</b> and boisterous character.</i>
<b>kindly</b>	Please (used in a polite request or demand, often ironically). <i>Would you <b>kindly</b> explain what you re talking about.</i>
<b>nice</b>	Done with delicacy and skill. <i><b>Nice</b> manners.</i>
<b>obliging</b>	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>One of the most <b>obliging</b> stewards.</i>
<b>outgoing</b>	A person's regular expenditure. <i>The inward deliveries and <b>outgoings</b> of raw materials.</i>
<b>personality</b>	Lively, engaging qualities. <i>She s always had loads of <b>personality</b>.</i>
<b>pleasant</b>	(of a person or their manner) friendly and considerate; likeable. <i>They found him <b>pleasant</b> and cooperative.</i>
<b>talkative</b>	Unwisely talking too much. <i>The <b>talkative</b> driver hadn t stopped chatting.</i>
