socializing The action or process of causing a person to behave in a way that is acceptable to their society.

*He didn't have time for **socializing**.*

- *Planned economic growth was accompanied by the socialization of agriculture.*
- *There was too much socialization with the enlisted men.*
- *Socialization with students has helped her communication skills.*
- *The socialization of medical services.*

- accept** Make use of or accept for some purpose.
*They **accepted** the need to cut overheads.*
- accordance** The act of granting rights.
*There is good **accordance** between the values.*
- agree** Consent or assent to a condition or agree to do something.
*White wine doesn't **agree** with me.*
- agreement** The verbal act of agreeing.
*The two officers nodded in **agreement**.*
- centrist** A person who holds moderate political views.
*A **centrist** politician.*
- compliance** The action or fact of complying with a wish or command.
*This paper estimates the **compliance** costs of such a policy change.*

comply	Act in accordance with a wish or command. <i>You must comply or else.</i>
conform	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The pressure to conform.</i>
conformism	Orthodoxy in thoughts and belief.
conformist	A person who conforms to accepted behaviour or established practices. <i>Organizations where employees are loyal without being unthinking conformists.</i>
conformity	Compliance with standards, rules, or laws. <i>A word of praise or an encouraging smile provide rewards for conformity to social norms.</i>
congratulate	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>The operators are to be congratulated for the service that they provide.</i>
congressional	Of or relating to congress. <i>The congressional agricultural committees.</i>
democratic	Relating to or supporting democracy or its principles. <i>Democratic government.</i>
enjoin	Issue an injunction. <i>The code enjoined members to trade fairly.</i>
equity	The difference between the market value of a property and the claims held against it. <i>If there is any conflict between the principles of common law and equity equity prevails.</i>
feudalistic	Of or relating to or characteristic of feudalism.
follow	Follow in or as if in pursuit. <i>The six years that followed his restoration.</i>
institution	A hospital for mentally incompetent or unbalanced person. <i>About 5 per cent of elderly people live in institutions.</i>
interaction	A mutual or reciprocal action; interacting. <i>Ongoing interaction between the two languages.</i>
interactive	Used especially of drugs or muscles that work together so the total effect is greater than the sum of the two (or more). <i>A fully interactive map of the area.</i>
liberalist	A person who favors a political philosophy of progress and reform and the protection of civil liberties.
mutual	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>My father hated him from the start and the feeling was mutual.</i>

- observance** The act of noticing or paying attention.
*He drew up a body of monastic **observances**.*
- political** Relating to the ideas or strategies of a particular party or group in politics.
*Calling a meeting is a **political** act in itself.*
- presidential** Having a bearing or demeanour befitting a president; dignified and confident.
*He is a very strong leader very **presidential** in his performance.*
- reciprocal** Mathematics one of a pair of numbers whose product is 1 the reciprocal of $\frac{2}{3}$ is $\frac{3}{2}$ the multiplicative inverse of 7 is $\frac{1}{7}$.
*The **reciprocal** ratio of a to b is $\frac{b}{a}$.*
- social** An informal social gathering especially one organized by the members of a particular club or group.
*The **social** structure of Europe had become more fluid.*
- uniformity** A condition in which everything is regular and unvarying.
*An attempt to impose administrative and cultural **uniformity**.*
