<u>lunatic</u>	An insane person. This lunatic just accelerated out from the side of the road.
madman	An extremely foolish or reckless person. Car got out of control some madman going too fast.
madwoman	A woman lunatic. She d driven my father s convertible like a madwoman .
maniac	A person exhibiting extremely wild or violent behaviour. A religious maniac .

psychotic A person suffering from a psychosis.

aggression	The act of initiating hostilities. The sheer volume and aggression of his playing.
antisocial	Relating to or having an antisocial personality disorder. Children s antisocial behaviour.
behaviour	The aggregate of the responses or reactions or movements made by an organism in any situation. Management is a set of techniques and behaviour s for getting things done.
<u>deranged</u>	Driven insane. A deranged gunman.
diatribe	Thunderous verbal attack. A diatribe against consumerism.
disaffected	Dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control. <i>A military plot by</i> disaffected <i>elements in the army.</i>
<u>disapproval</u>	The expression of disapproval. Jill replied with a hint of disapproval in her voice.
disturbed	Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief. Disturbed grass showed where the horse had passed.
<u>enmity</u>	A state or feeling of active opposition or hostility. Decades of enmity between the two countries.
exhibitionist	A person who behaves in an extravagant way in order to attract attention. <i>I am something of an exhibitionist</i> .
<u>ferocious</u>	Very great; extreme. A ferocious battle.
<u>ferocity</u>	The property of being wild or turbulent. The ferocity of the storm caught them by surprise.
furious	Full of anger or energy; violent or intense. <i>Furious</i> winds.



<u>hostile</u>	Of or belonging to a military enemy. The platoon ran into a pack of hostile s.
<u>illness</u>	Impairment of normal physiological function affecting part or all of an organism. I ve never missed a day s work through illness .
<u>incongruous</u>	Lacking in harmony or compatibility or appropriateness. <i>Incongruous</i> behavior.
<u>insane</u>	Afflicted with or characteristic of mental derangement. <i>The peanut butter chocolate is insane</i> .
mentally	In your mind. Soldiers become physically and mentally exhausted.
narcissist	A person who has an excessive interest in or admiration of themselves. <i>Narcissists preening themselves in front of the mirror.</i>
<u>psychopath</u>	Someone with a sociopathic personality a person with an antisocial personality disorder psychopath was once widely used but has now been superseded by sociopath. Playground psychopaths will gather around a fight to encourage the combatants.
<u>rampage</u>	Violently angry and destructive behavior. Several thousand demonstrators rampage d through the city.
<u>reckless</u>	Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences. <i>Reckless</i> squandering of public funds.
<u>reclusive</u>	Providing privacy or seclusion. He led a reclusive life.
<u>scarred</u>	Deeply affected or marked by mental or physical pain or injury. Could her scarred mind ever be free of fear.
selfishness	Stinginess resulting from a concern for your own welfare and a disregard of others. An act of pure selfishness .
tempestuous	(of the elements) as if showing violent anger. A tempestuous wind.
<u>unfriendly</u>	Very unfavorable to life or growth. The unfriendly environment at high altitudes.
unsocial	Not seeking or given to association; being or living without companions. The unsocial behaviour of young teenagers.
violent	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>Violent dislike.</i>



withdrawn Withdrawn from society seeking solitude. When her husband died she became very withdrawn.
