Definitions of "Soiled" as an adjective

Associations of "Soiled" (30 Words)

accumulated	Periodically accumulated over time.
adobe	The clay from which adobe bricks are made. <i>Adobe houses.</i>
bedrock	Solid unweathered rock lying beneath surface deposits of soil. <i>Honesty is the bedrock of a good relationship.</i>
compost	Make vegetable matter or manure into compost. <i>Compost organic debris.</i>
deposition	The natural process of laying down a deposit of something. <i>Pebbles formed by the deposition of calcium in solution.</i>
desertification	The process by which fertile land becomes desert, typically as a result of drought, deforestation, or inappropriate agriculture. <i>The dust storms in Korea are the result of rapid desertification in China.</i>

erode	Gradually destroy or be gradually destroyed. <i>Soft sedimentary rocks have eroded away.</i>
erosion	Erosion by chemical action. <i>After the accounting scandal there was an erosion of confidence in the auditors.</i>
fertilization	Making fertile as by applying fertilizer or manure.
fluvial	Of or found in a river. <i>Fluvial deposits.</i>
<u>gradually</u>	In a gradual manner. <i>The snake moved gradually toward its victim.</i>
<u>hill</u>	Form into a hill. <i>A hill of ruffs looked at from a distance on a sunny day was a very pleasing spectacle.</i>
hummock	A piece of forested ground rising above a marsh.
humus	The organic component of soil, formed by the decomposition of leaves and other plant material by soil microorganisms.
<u>layer</u>	Arrange in a layer or layers. <i>They can be increased from cuttings and layers.</i>
loam	A rich soil consisting of a mixture of sand and clay and decaying organic materials.
manure	Apply manure to land. <i>The ground should be well dug and manured.</i>
mound	A large pile or quantity of something. <i>They built small mounds to hide behind.</i>
<u>mud</u>	Soil with mud muck or mire. <i>The two sides took over the local media to throw mud at each other.</i>
peat	A cut piece of peat. <i>He reached forward to add a couple of peats to the fire.</i>
pleistocene	From two million to 11 thousand years ago; extensive glaciation of the northern hemisphere; the time of human evolution.
quicksand	A treacherous situation that tends to entrap and destroy. <i>John found himself sinking fast in financial quicksand.</i>
riverbank	The bank of a river.
riverbed	The bed or channel in which a river flows.
sandy	Resembling or containing or abounding in sand or growing in sandy areas. <i>Pale eyes and receding sandy hair.</i>

sediment	Deposit as a sediment. <i>The DNA was sedimented by centrifugation.</i>
sedimentation	The process of settling or being deposited as a sediment. <i>Sedimentation occurs when the droplets sink to the bottom.</i>
silt	Become filled or blocked with silt. <i>The soil ends up silting up the stream.</i>
sludge	The precipitate produced by sewage treatment. <i>Miscellaneous chemicals and treated sludges.</i>
topsoil	The top layer of soil. <i>Keep all the topsoil you remove you re bound to find a use for it later.</i>
