### Definitions of "Solace" as a noun

- *The act of consoling; giving relief in affliction.*
- *Comfort or consolation in a time of distress or sadness.*
- *Comfort in disappointment or misery.*
- *The comfort you feel when consoled in times of disappointment.*

- cheer** Cheerfulness optimism or confidence.  
*An attempt to inject a little **cheer** into this gloomy season.*
- comfort** A freedom from financial difficulty that promotes a comfortable state.  
*There is room for four people to travel in **comfort**.*
- consolation** A person or thing providing consolation.  
*Second place was no **consolation** to him.*
- relief** A representation of relief given by an arrangement of line or colour or shading.  
*He has been on **relief** for many years.*
- solacement** Comfort in disappointment or misery.

**support**

A musical part vocal or instrumental that supports or provides background for other musical parts.

*His faith was all the **support** he needed.*

### Definitions of "Solace" as a verb

- *Give comfort or consolation to.*
- *Give moral or emotional strength to.*



## Synonyms of "Solace" as a verb (8 Words)

<b>calm</b>	Make calm or still. <i>I took him inside and tried to <b>calm</b> him down.</i>
<b><u>cheer</u></b>	Cause somebody to feel happier or more cheerful. <i>He seemed greatly <b>cheered</b> by my arrival.</i>
<b>comfort</b>	Lessen pain or discomfort alleviate. <i>He dined outdoors <b>comforted</b> by the crackling sounds of the fire.</i>
<b><u>console</u></b>	Comfort (someone) at a time of grief or disappointment. <i>She tried to <b>console</b> him but he pushed her gently away.</i>
<b>give solace to</b>	Present to view.
<b>relieve</b>	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>He dispatched an expedition to <b>relieve</b> the city.</i>
<b>soothe</b>	Cause to feel better. <i>To <b>soothe</b> the skin try chamomile or thyme.</i>

**support** Support materially or financially.  
*The proposal was **supported** by many delegates.*

## Usage Examples of "Solace" as a verb

- *The soundlessness of nature impressed and solaced her.*
- *I solaced myself with a slab of chocolate.*

## Associations of "Solace" (30 Words)

<b>allay</b>	Relieve or alleviate (pain or hunger). <i>The report attempted to educate the public and <b>allay</b> fears.</i>
<b><u>alleviate</u></b>	Make (suffering, deficiency, or a problem) less severe. <i>He couldn't prevent her pain only <b>alleviate</b> it.</i>
<b>antispasmodic</b>	An antispasmodic drug.
<b><u>appease</u></b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>We give to charity because it <b>appeases</b> our guilt.</i>
<b>assuage</b>	Satisfy (an appetite or desire). <i>An opportunity occurred to <b>assuage</b> her desire for knowledge.</i>
<b><u>caress</u></b>	A gentle or loving touch. <i>A gentle breeze <b>caressed</b> his skin.</i>
<b>comfort</b>	Lessen pain or discomfort alleviate. <i>A padded chair was one of the room's few <b>comforts</b>.</i>
<b><u>consolation</u></b>	A person or thing providing consolation. <i>The Church was the main <b>consolation</b> in a short and hard life.</i>
<b><u>domestic</u></b>	Converted or adapted to domestic use. <i><b>Domestic</b> happiness.</i>
<b>domesticity</b>	The quality of being domestic or domesticated. <i>A royal family living in unpretentious <b>domesticity</b>.</i>
<b><u>ease</u></b>	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i><b>Ease</b> the pain in your legs.</i>
<b>encouragement</b>	The act of giving hope or support to someone. <i>Incentives and <b>encouragement</b> to play sports.</i>
<b>ergonomic</b>	Of or relating to ergonomics. <i>Workstations with <b>ergonomic</b> chairs.</i>
<b>home</b>	Return home accurately from a long distance. <i>The United States is the <b>home</b> of basketball.</i>

<b>lightweight</b>	A lightweight boxer or other competitor. <i>I m a total <b>lightweight</b> so generally I don t drink a whole lot.</i>
<b>lull</b>	Make (someone) feel deceptively secure or confident. <i>The rarity of earthquakes there has <b>lulled</b> people into a false sense of security.</i>
<b>mitigate</b>	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>There had been a provocation that <b>mitigated</b> the offence to a degree.</i>
<b>mollify</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>Nature reserves were set up around the power stations to <b>mollify</b> local conservationists.</i>
<b>pacify</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>The U N troops are working to <b>pacify</b> Bosnia.</i>
<b>paregoric</b>	Medicine used to treat diarrhea.
<b>placate</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>They attempted to <b>placate</b> the students with promises.</i>
<b>portable</b>	A small transportable building used as a classroom. <i><b>Portable</b> versions of IBM s Systems Network Architecture technology.</i>
<b>quell</b>	Overcome or allay. <i>Connor <b>quelled</b> him with a look.</i>
<b>relaxation</b>	(physiology) the gradual lengthening of inactive muscle or muscle fibers. <i><b>Relaxation</b> of censorship rules.</i>
<b>relieve</b>	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>The bird s body is black <b>relieved</b> only by white under the tail.</i>
<b>sheltered</b>	(of a place) protected from bad weather. <i>A <b>sheltered</b> childhood.</i>
<b>simplicity</b>	Freedom from difficulty or hardship or effort. <i>They took advantage of her <b>simplicity</b>.</i>
<b>simplify</b>	Make simpler or easier or reduce in complexity or extent. <i>An overhaul of court procedure to <b>simplify</b> litigation.</i>
<b>soothe</b>	Gently calm (a person or their feelings). <i>It contains a mild anaesthetic to <b>soothe</b> the pain.</i>
<b>succor</b>	Help in a difficult situation.
