Definitions of "Solace" as a noun

*His faith was all the **support** he needed.*

Synonyms of "Solace" as a verb (8 Words)

- calm** Make calm or still.
*I took him inside and tried to **calm** him down.*
- cheer** Cause somebody to feel happier or more cheerful.
*He seemed greatly **cheered** by my arrival.*
- comfort** Lessen pain or discomfort alleviate.
*He dined outdoors **comforted** by the crackling sounds of the fire.*
- console** Comfort (someone) at a time of grief or disappointment.
*She tried to **console** him but he pushed her gently away.*
- give solace to** Present to view.
- relieve** Relieve oneself of troubling information.
*He dispatched an expedition to **relieve** the city.*
- soothe** Cause to feel better.
*To **soothe** the skin try chamomile or thyme.*

support Support materially or financially.
*The proposal was **supported** by many delegates.*

Usage Examples of "Solace" as a verb

- *The soundlessness of nature impressed and solaced her.*
- *I solaced myself with a slab of chocolate.*

allay	Relieve or alleviate (pain or hunger). <i>The report attempted to educate the public and allay fears.</i>
<u>alleviate</u>	Make (suffering, deficiency, or a problem) less severe. <i>He couldn't prevent her pain only alleviate it.</i>

<u>appease</u>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>We give to charity because it appeases our guilt.</i>

<u>domestic</u>	Converted or adapted to domestic use. <i>Domestic happiness.</i>
domesticity	The quality of being domestic or domesticated. <i>A royal family living in unpretentious domesticity.</i>
<u>ease</u>	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i>Ease the pain in your legs.</i>
encouragement	The act of giving hope or support to someone. <i>Incentives and encouragement to play sports.</i>
ergonomic	Of or relating to ergonomics. <i>Workstations with ergonomic chairs.</i>
home	Return home accurately from a long distance. <i>The United States is the home of basketball.</i>

lightweight	A lightweight boxer or other competitor. <i>I m a total lightweight so generally I don t drink a whole lot.</i>
lull	Make (someone) feel deceptively secure or confident. <i>The rarity of earthquakes there has lulled people into a false sense of security.</i>
mitigate	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>There had been a provocation that mitigated the offence to a degree.</i>
mollify	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>Nature reserves were set up around the power stations to mollify local conservationists.</i>
pacify	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>The U N troops are working to pacify Bosnia.</i>
paregoric	Medicine used to treat diarrhea.
placate	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>They attempted to placate the students with promises.</i>
portable	A small transportable building used as a classroom. <i>Portable versions of IBM s Systems Network Architecture technology.</i>
quell	Overcome or allay. <i>Connor quelled him with a look.</i>
relaxation	(physiology) the gradual lengthening of inactive muscle or muscle fibers. <i>Relaxation of censorship rules.</i>
relieve	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>The bird s body is black relieved only by white under the tail.</i>
sheltered	(of a place) protected from bad weather. <i>A sheltered childhood.</i>
simplicity	Freedom from difficulty or hardship or effort. <i>They took advantage of her simplicity.</i>
simplify	Make simpler or easier or reduce in complexity or extent. <i>An overhaul of court procedure to simplify litigation.</i>
soothe	Gently calm (a person or their feelings). <i>It contains a mild anaesthetic to soothe the pain.</i>
succor	Help in a difficult situation.
