Solicitation as a Noun

Definitions of "Solicitation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “solicitation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An entreaty addressed to someone of superior status.*
- *The act of asking for or trying to obtain something from someone.*
- *The act of accosting someone and offering one's or someone else's services as a prostitute.*
- *Request for a sum of money.*
- *The act of enticing a person to do something wrong (as an offer of sex in return for money).*



Synonyms of "Solicitation" as a noun (4 Words)

- allurement** Attractiveness.
*Its **allurement** was its remoteness.*
- appeal** Request for a sum of money.
*His mother made an **appeal** for the return of the ring.*
- collection** A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection.
*A **collection** of essays.*
- ingathering** Request for a sum of money.



Usage Examples of "Solicitation" as a noun

- *He was a regular target for solicitation of funds.*
- *A solicitation to the king for relief.*
- *A woman arrested for solicitation.*
- *People objected to receiving telephone solicitations.*



Associations of "Solicitation" (30 Words)

appeal	Take a court case to a higher court for review. <i>A look of appeal on his face.</i>
asking	The verbal act of requesting.
beg	Acquire food or money from someone by begging. <i>He begged his fellow passengers for help.</i>
beseech	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>They beseached him to stay.</i>
cadge	Ask for and get free; be a parasite. <i>He cadged fivers off old school friends.</i>

<u>conjure</u>	Implore (someone) to do something. <i>Anne conjured up a delicious home made hotpot.</i>
<u>crave</u>	Feel a powerful desire for (something). <i>If only she had shown her daughter the love she craved.</i>
<u>desperately</u>	In a way that shows despair. <i>The soil desperately needed potash.</i>
<u>entreat</u>	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>His friends entreated him not to go.</i>
entreaty	An earnest or humble request. <i>An entreaty to stop the fighting.</i>
exhortation	An address or communication emphatically urging someone to do something. <i>Exhortations to consumers to switch off electrical appliances.</i>
implore	Beg earnestly for. <i>I implore mercy.</i>
<u>invitation</u>	A written or verbal request inviting someone to go somewhere or to do something. <i>A herb garden where guests can only go at the invitation of the chef.</i>
invite	Invite someone to one's house. <i>Applications are invited for the post of Director.</i>
invocation	An incantation used to invoke a deity or the supernatural. <i>His invocation of the ancient powers of Callanish.</i>
necessary	Absolutely essential. <i>The necessary consequences of one's actions.</i>
perforce	Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
<u>petition</u>	Reverent petition to a deity. <i>The organization is petitioning the EU for a moratorium on the patent.</i>
<u>plea</u>	A formal statement by or on behalf of a defendant or prisoner, stating guilt or innocence in response to a charge, offering an allegation of fact, or claiming that a point of law should apply. <i>He changed his plea to not guilty.</i>
<u>plead</u>	Make an allegation in an action or other legal proceeding especially answer the previous pleading of the other party by denying facts therein stated or by alleging new facts. <i>The youth pleaded guilty to murdering the girl.</i>
<u>please</u>	It is someone's choice to do something. <i>Would you like a drink Yes please.</i>

<u>pray</u>	Address a prayer to God or another deity. <i>And what pray was the purpose of that.</i>
<u>prayer</u>	Earnest or urgent request. <i>The priest sank to his knees in prayer.</i>
request	A tune or song played on a radio programme typically accompanied by a personal message in response to a listener's request. <i>The chairman requested that the reports be considered.</i>
<u>solicit</u>	Make a solicitation or entreaty for something request urgently or persistently. <i>Historians and critics are solicited for opinions by the auction houses.</i>
suppliant	Humbly entreating. <i>A suppliant sinner seeking forgiveness.</i>
supplicant	A person making a humble or earnest plea to someone in power or authority. <i>We are equals and not supplicants begging for work.</i>
supplicate	Ask or beg for something earnestly or humbly. <i>Supplicate God's blessing.</i>
supplication	A humble request for help from someone in authority. <i>He fell to his knees in supplication.</i>
woo	Seek someone's favor. <i>China is wooing Russia.</i>
