### Definitions of "Solidarity" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “solidarity” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A union of interests or purposes or sympathies among members of a group.*
- *An independent trade union movement in Poland which developed into a mass campaign for political change and inspired popular opposition to Communist regimes across eastern Europe. Formed in 1980 under the leadership of Lech Wałęsa, it was banned in 1981 following the imposition of martial law. Legalized again in 1989, it won a majority in the elections of that year.*
- *Unity or agreement of feeling or action, especially among individuals with a common interest; mutual support within a group.*

### cohesion

The state of cohering or sticking together.

### concord

Liveliness of mind or spirit.

harmony

The combination of simultaneously sounded musical notes to produce a pleasing effect.

*The piece owes its air of tranquillity largely to the **harmony**.*

**singleness of purpose**

What something is used for.

**team spirit**

Two or more draft animals that work together to pull something.

**unanimity**

Everyone being of one mind.

*There is almost complete **unanimity** on this issue.*

unity

Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action.

*European **unity**.*

<b><u>coordination</u></b>	Being of coordinate importance, rank, or degree. <i>An important managerial task is the control and <b>coordination</b> of activities.</i>
<b>empathy</b>	The ability to understand and share the feelings of another.
<b>fraternal</b>	Of or relating to a fraternity or society of usually men. <i>His lack of <b>fraternal</b> feeling shocked me.</i>
<b>fraternize</b>	Associate or form a friendship with someone, especially when one is not supposed to. <i>She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.</i>
<b><u>harmony</u></b>	The structure of music with respect to the composition and progression of chords. <i>Man and machine in perfect <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>indivisible</b>	(of a number) unable to be divided by another number exactly without leaving a remainder. <i>One nation <b>indivisible</b>.</i>
<b>inseparable</b>	A person or thing inseparable from another. <i>Research and higher education seem <b>inseparable</b>.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	Resembling a living organism in organization or development. <i><b>Integrated</b> education.</i>
<b>interaction</b>	(physics) the transfer of energy between elementary particles or between an elementary particle and a field or between fields; mediated by gauge bosons. <i>Ongoing <b>interaction</b> between the two languages.</i>
<b>joint</b>	A section of a plant stem between two joints an internode. <i>The carpenter <b>jointed</b> two pieces of wood.</i>
