## Soliloquy as a Noun

### Definitions of "Soliloquy" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “soliloquy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An act of speaking one's thoughts aloud when by oneself or regardless of any hearers, especially by a character in a play.*
- *Speech you make to yourself.*
- *A part of a play involving a soliloquy.*
- *A (usually long) dramatic speech intended to give the illusion of unspoken reflections.*

### Synonyms of "Soliloquy" as a noun (8 Words)

<b>address</b>	Courteous or amorous approaches to someone. <i>He failed in his manner of <b>address</b> to the captain.</i>
<b>aside</b>	A remark that is not directly related to the main topic of discussion. <i>Shakespeare s use of <b>asides</b> and soliloquies.</i>
<b>homily</b>	A religious discourse which is intended primarily for spiritual edification rather than doctrinal instruction. <i>She delivered her <b>homily</b> about the need for patience.</i>

<b>lecture</b>	A speech that is open to the public. <i>He attended a <b>lecture</b> on telecommunications.</i>
<b>monologue</b>	A long speech by one actor in a play or film, or as part of a theatrical or broadcast programme. <i>He was reciting some of the great <b>monologues</b> of Shakespeare.</i>
<b>oration</b>	The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>He delivered an <b>oration</b> on the decline of family values.</i>
<b>sermon</b>	A long or tedious piece of admonition or reproof; a lecture. <i>He understood that if he said any more he would have to listen to another lengthy <b>sermon</b>.</i>
<b>speech</b>	The exchange of spoken words. <i>He gave a <b>speech</b> about the company.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Soliloquy" as a noun

- *He did most of his thinking by soliloquy.*
- *Edmund ends the scene as he had begun it, with a soliloquy.*
- *In the opening soliloquy he declares his true intent.*

## Associations of "Soliloquy" (30 Words)

<b>aforementioned</b>	Denoting a thing or person previously mentioned. <i>Songs from the <b>aforementioned</b> album.</i>
<b>aforesaid</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
<b>aloud</b>	Loudly. <i>Cried <b>aloud</b> for help.</i>
<b>colloquy</b>	A conversation. <i>They broke off their <b>colloquy</b> at once.</i>
<b>conversation</b>	A talk, especially an informal one, between two or more people, in which news and ideas are exchanged. <i>She picked up the phone and held a <b>conversation</b> in French.</i>
<b>conversational</b>	As used in conversation; not formal. <i>The broken syntax and casual enunciation of <b>conversational</b> English.</i>
<b>delineate</b>	Determine the essential quality of. <i>The law should <b>delineate</b> and prohibit behaviour which is socially abhorrent.</i>
<b>dialog</b>	The lines spoken by characters in drama or fiction.

<b>dialogue</b>	Provide a film or play with a dialogue. <i>They disagreed but kept an open <b>dialogue</b>.</i>
<b>expansive</b>	(of a person or their manner) relaxed and genially frank and communicative. <i><b>Expansive</b> domestic economic policies.</i>
<b>incantation</b>	A ritual recitation of words or sounds believed to have a magical effect. <i>An <b>incantation</b> to raise the dead.</i>
<b>invocation</b>	The action of invoking someone or something. <i>His <b>invocation</b> of the ancient powers of Callanish.</i>
<b>itemize</b>	Present as a list of individual items. <i>I have <b>itemized</b> the morning s tasks.</i>
<b>litany</b>	A litany contained in the Book of Common Prayer. <i>A <b>litany</b> of complaints.</i>
<b>memorize</b>	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>Have you <b>memorized</b> your lines for the play yet.</i>
<b>monologue</b>	A long utterance by one person (especially one that prevents others from participating in the conversation). <i>Fred carried on with his <b>monologue</b> as if I hadn t spoken.</i>
<b>narrate</b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The story is <b>narrated</b> by the heroine.</i>
<b>narration</b>	(rhetoric) the second section of an oration in which the facts are set forth. <i>There s no dialogue or <b>narration</b>.</i>
<b>orate</b>	Talk pompously. <i>Hamlet thinks speaks <b>orates</b> and acts.</i>
<b>protagonist</b>	The leading character or one of the major characters in a play, film, novel, etc. <i>The hard boiled <b>protagonist</b> of the movie Blade Runner.</i>
<b>recitative</b>	Musical declamation of the kind usual in the narrative and dialogue parts of opera and oratorio, sung in the rhythm of ordinary speech with many words on the same note. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b>recite</b>	Recite in elocution. <i>The pupil <b>recited</b> his lesson for the day.</i>
<b>recount</b>	Count again. <i>I <b>recounted</b> the tale to Steve.</i>
<b>report</b>	The act of informing by verbal report. <i>Undisclosed illegalities are <b>reported</b> to the company s directors.</i>

<b>reportedly</b>	According to reports or other information. <i>He was in El Salvador <b>reportedly</b> on his way to Texas.</i>
<b>rote</b>	Mechanical or habitual repetition of something to be learned. <i>A poem learnt by <b>rote</b> in childhood.</i>
<b>storybook</b>	A book containing a story or collection of stories intended for children. <i>It was a <b>storybook</b> finish to an illustrious career.</i>
<b>talking</b>	The action of talking speech or discussion. <i>He did have <b>talking</b> eyes.</i>
<u><b>utter</b></u>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i><b>Utter</b> nonsense.</i>
<u><b>verbalize</b></u>	Convert into a verb. <i>Many English nouns have become <b>verbalized</b>.</i>
