## Definitions of "Soliloguy" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "soliloquy" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- An act of speaking one's thoughts aloud when by oneself or regardless of any hearers, especially by a character in a play.
- Speech you make to yourself.
- A part of a play involving a soliloguy.
- A (usually long) dramatic speech intended to give the illusion of unspoken reflections.
