backwoods	A remote and undeveloped area. <i>Backwoods homesteads.</i>
<u>desolation</u>	The state of being decayed or destroyed. <i>The stony desolation of the desert.</i>
<u>isolation</u>	A country's withdrawal from international politics. <i>Isolation from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
loneliness	The state of being alone in solitary isolation. <i>The loneliness of a sailor's life.</i>
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>Police action to restore peace.</i>
peace and quiet	The state prevailing during the absence of war.
<u>privacy</u>	A state in which one is not observed or disturbed by other people. <i>A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people's privacy.</i>
privateness	The condition of being concealed or hidden.
pardah	A curtain used for the purpose of pardah. <i>It is very difficult at the moment with the election on and the government in pardah.</i>
remoteness	The state of being unlikely to occur. <i>The remoteness of politics from everyday life.</i>
retirement	Seclusion. <i>A three hour retirement.</i>
seclusion	The state of being private and away from other people. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and seclusion.</i>
solitariness	A disposition toward being alone.
the back of beyond	A support that you can lean against while sitting.
<u>wilderness</u>	An uncultivated, uninhabited, and inhospitable region. <i>His wilderness years.</i>
wilds	A wild and uninhabited area left in its natural condition. <i>He lived in the wild.</i>
withdrawal	The action of ceasing to participate in an activity. <i>The nurse was expert at the withdrawal of blood.</i>

- alienation** Separation resulting from hostility.
*A sense of **alienation** from our environment.*
- alone** Lacking companions or companionship.
*She **alone** believed him.*
- angst** A feeling of persistent worry about something trivial.
*My hair causes me **angst**.*
- boredom** The feeling of being bored by something tedious.
*I ll die of **boredom** if I live that long.*
- despondency** Feeling downcast and disheartened and hopeless.
*An air of **despondency**.*

divorce	Get a divorce formally terminate a marriage. <i>She divorced him in 1965.</i>
ennui	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>He succumbed to ennui and despair.</i>
estrangle	Cause (someone) to be no longer on friendly terms with someone. <i>He became estranged from his father.</i>
estrangement	The fact of no longer living with one's spouse or partner; separation. <i>The growing estrangement of the police from their communities.</i>
gloom	Be or look depressed or despondent. <i>The black gibbet glooms beside the way.</i>
grief	An instance or cause of intense sorrow. <i>We were too tired to cause any grief.</i>
heartache	Emotional anguish or grief, typically caused by the loss or absence of someone loved. <i>A good friend understands your heartaches as well as your joys.</i>
hermit	A hummingbird found in the shady lower layers of tropical forests, foraging along a regular route.
homesickness	A longing to return home. <i>I lived four years in London without a single pang of homesickness.</i>
isolate	A culture of microorganisms isolated for study. <i>The governor urged residents to isolate to limit the spread of the virus.</i>
isolated	Being or feeling set or kept apart from others- Sherwood Anderson. <i>Isolated incidents of student unrest.</i>
isolation	A country's withdrawal from international politics. <i>Isolation from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
loneliness	Sadness resulting from being forsaken or abandoned. <i>The loneliness of a sailor's life.</i>
monotony	The quality of wearisome constancy, routine, and lack of variety. <i>Depression flattens the voice almost to monotony.</i>
nostalgia	Something done or presented in order to evoke feelings of nostalgia. <i>An evening of TV nostalgia.</i>
privacy	The state of being free from public attention. <i>She returned to the privacy of her own home.</i>
recluse	One who lives in solitude. <i>He's a bit of a recluse.</i>
secluded	(of a place) not seen or visited by many people; sheltered and private. <i>The gardens are quiet and secluded.</i>

- seclusion** A sheltered or private place.
*They enjoyed ten days of peace and **seclusion**.*
- sequester** A general cut in government spending.
*He **sequestered** himself in his study to write a book.*
- sole** Put a new sole on.
***Sole** rights of publication.*
- solitary** Confinement of a prisoner in isolation from other prisoners.
*A **solitary** traveler.*
- tedium** The feeling of being bored by something tedious.
*The **tedium** of car journeys.*
- troglydite** Someone who lives in a cave.
