<b>backwoods</b>	A remote and undeveloped area. <i><b>Backwoods</b> homesteads.</i>
<b><u>desolation</u></b>	The state of being decayed or destroyed. <i>The stony <b>desolation</b> of the desert.</i>
<b><u>isolation</u></b>	A country's withdrawal from international politics. <i><b>Isolation</b> from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
<b>loneliness</b>	The state of being alone in solitary isolation. <i>The <b>loneliness</b> of a sailor's life.</i>
<b>peace</b>	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>Police action to restore <b>peace</b>.</i>
<b>peace and quiet</b>	The state prevailing during the absence of war.
<b><u>privacy</u></b>	A state in which one is not observed or disturbed by other people. <i>A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people's <b>privacy</b>.</i>
<b>privateness</b>	The condition of being concealed or hidden.
<b>pardah</b>	A curtain used for the purpose of pardah. <i>It is very difficult at the moment with the election on and the government in <b>pardah</b>.</i>
<b>remoteness</b>	The state of being unlikely to occur. <i>The <b>remoteness</b> of politics from everyday life.</i>
<b>retirement</b>	Seclusion. <i>A three hour <b>retirement</b>.</i>
<b>seclusion</b>	The state of being private and away from other people. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and <b>seclusion</b>.</i>
<b>solitariness</b>	A disposition toward being alone.
<b>the back of beyond</b>	A support that you can lean against while sitting.
<b><u>wilderness</u></b>	An uncultivated, uninhabited, and inhospitable region. <i>His <b>wilderness</b> years.</i>
<b>wilds</b>	A wild and uninhabited area left in its natural condition. <i>He lived in the wild.</i>
<b>withdrawal</b>	The action of ceasing to participate in an activity. <i>The nurse was expert at the <b>withdrawal</b> of blood.</i>

## Associations of "Solitude" (30 Words)

<b><u>alienate</u></b>	Make withdrawn or isolated or emotionally dissociated. <i>An urban environment which would <b>alienate</b> its inhabitants.</i>
<b><u>alienation</u></b>	Separation resulting from hostility. <i>A sense of <b>alienation</b> from our environment.</i>
<b>alone</b>	Lacking companions or companionship. <i>She <b>alone</b> believed him.</i>
<b><u>angst</u></b>	A feeling of persistent worry about something trivial. <i>My hair causes me <b>angst</b>.</i>
<b><u>boredom</u></b>	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>I ll die of <b>boredom</b> if I live that long.</i>
<b>despondency</b>	Feeling downcast and disheartened and hopeless. <i>An air of <b>despondency</b>.</i>

<b><u>divorce</u></b>	Get a divorce formally terminate a marriage. <i>She <b>divorced</b> him in 1965.</i>
<b>ennui</b>	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>He succumbed to <b>ennui</b> and despair.</i>
<b>estrangle</b>	Cause (someone) to be no longer on friendly terms with someone. <i>He became <b>estranged</b> from his father.</i>
<b><u>estrangement</u></b>	The fact of no longer living with one's spouse or partner; separation. <i>The growing <b>estrangement</b> of the police from their communities.</i>
<b>gloom</b>	Be or look depressed or despondent. <i>The black gibbet <b>glooms</b> beside the way.</i>
<b><u>grief</u></b>	An instance or cause of intense sorrow. <i>We were too tired to cause any <b>grief</b>.</i>
<b>heartache</b>	Emotional anguish or grief, typically caused by the loss or absence of someone loved. <i>A good friend understands your <b>heartaches</b> as well as your joys.</i>
<b><u>hermit</u></b>	A hummingbird found in the shady lower layers of tropical forests, foraging along a regular route.
<b>homesickness</b>	A longing to return home. <i>I lived four years in London without a single pang of <b>homesickness</b>.</i>
<b>isolate</b>	A culture of microorganisms isolated for study. <i>The governor urged residents to <b>isolate</b> to limit the spread of the virus.</i>
<b>isolated</b>	Being or feeling set or kept apart from others- Sherwood Anderson. <i><b>Isolated</b> incidents of student unrest.</i>
<b><u>isolation</u></b>	A country's withdrawal from international politics. <i><b>Isolation</b> from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
<b>loneliness</b>	Sadness resulting from being forsaken or abandoned. <i>The <b>loneliness</b> of a sailor's life.</i>
<b><u>monotony</u></b>	The quality of wearisome constancy, routine, and lack of variety. <i>Depression flattens the voice almost to <b>monotony</b>.</i>
<b><u>nostalgia</u></b>	Something done or presented in order to evoke feelings of nostalgia. <i>An evening of TV <b>nostalgia</b>.</i>
<b><u>privacy</u></b>	The state of being free from public attention. <i>She returned to the <b>privacy</b> of her own home.</i>
<b><u>recluse</u></b>	One who lives in solitude. <i>He's a bit of a <b>recluse</b>.</i>
<b><u>secluded</u></b>	(of a place) not seen or visited by many people; sheltered and private. <i>The gardens are quiet and <b>secluded</b>.</i>

<b>seclusion</b>	A sheltered or private place. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and <b>seclusion</b>.</i>
<b><u>sequester</u></b>	A general cut in government spending. <i>He <b>sequestered</b> himself in his study to write a book.</i>
<b><u>sole</u></b>	Put a new sole on. <i><b>Sole</b> rights of publication.</i>
<b><u>solitary</u></b>	Confinement of a prisoner in isolation from other prisoners. <i>A <b>solitary</b> traveler.</i>
<b>tedium</b>	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>The <b>tedium</b> of car journeys.</i>
<b>troglydite</b>	Someone who lives in a cave.
