### Definitions of "Somatic" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “somatic” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Relating to the body, especially as distinct from the mind.*
- *Relating to the soma.*
- *Affecting or characteristic of the body as opposed to the mind or spirit.*



## Synonyms of "Somatic" as an adjective (11 Words)

<b>corporal</b>	Possessing or existing in bodily form- Shakespeare. <i>A <b>corporal</b> defect.</i>
<b><u>corporeal</u></b>	Relating to a person's body, especially as opposed to their spirit. <i>That which is created is of necessity <b>corporeal</b> and visible and tangible.</i>
<b>human</b>	Having human form or attributes as opposed to those of animals or divine beings. <i>The <b>human</b> body.</i>
<b>material</b>	Having material or physical form or substance. <i><b>Material</b> living standards have risen.</i>
<b>materialistic</b>	Marked by materialism. <i>We re living in a highly <b>materialistic</b> society.</i>
<b>mortal</b>	Involving loss of divine grace or spiritual death. <i>He was in a <b>mortal</b> hurry.</i>

<b>mundane</b>	Of this earthly world rather than a heavenly or spiritual one. <i>His <b>mundane</b> humdrum existence.</i>
<b>secular</b>	Not concerned with or devoted to religion. <i><b>Secular</b> attitudes to death.</i>
<b>temporal</b>	Characteristic of or devoted to the temporal world as opposed to the spiritual world. <i><b>Temporal</b> possessions of the church.</i>
<b>worldly</b>	(of a person) experienced and sophisticated. <i>The benefits of his <b>worldly</b> wisdom.</i>

### Usage Examples of "Somatic" as an adjective

- Patients completed a questionnaire about their somatic and psychological symptoms.
- A somatic symptom or somatic illness.

### Associations of "Somatic" (30 Words)

<b>adipose</b>	(especially of body tissue) used for the storage of fat. <i><b>Adipose</b> tissue constitutes the fat of meat.</i>
<b>afferent</b>	An afferent nerve fibre or vessel. <i><b>Afferent</b> impulses.</i>
<b>byproduct</b>	A secondary and sometimes unexpected consequence.
<b>contents</b>	A list of divisions (chapters or articles) and the pages on which they start. <i>He emptied the <b>contents</b> of his pockets.</i>
<b>corporal</b>	A rank of non commissioned officer in the army above lance corporal or private first class and below sergeant. <i>What seemed <b>corporal</b> melted as breath into the wind.</i>
<b>corporeal</b>	Having material or physical form or substance - Benjamin Jowett. <i>In Scotland goods includes all <b>corporeal</b> movables except money.</i>
<b>drapery</b>	The depiction of folds of cloth in sculpture or painting. <i>The hall of the school was hung with green <b>drapery</b>.</i>
<b>felt</b>	Make into felt mat together. <i>The fibres are shredded and <b>felted</b> together.</i>
<b>filling</b>	The act of filling something. <i>A gold <b>filling</b>.</i>

<b>fitness</b>	Fitness to traverse the seas. <i>If sharp teeth increase <b>fitness</b> then genes causing teeth to be sharp will increase in frequency.</i>
<b>frailty</b>	The condition of being weak and delicate. <i>The increasing <b>frailty</b> of old age.</i>
<b>freon</b>	An aerosol propellant, refrigerant, or organic solvent consisting of one or more of a group of chlorofluorocarbons and related compounds.
<b><u>gym</u></b>	Gymnastics. <i>I can t do <b>gym</b> today.</i>
<b>hyperactivity</b>	Constantly active and sometimes disruptive behaviour, occurring primarily in children. <i><b>Hyperactivity</b> of the thyroid gland.</i>
<b>infirmity</b>	The state of being weak in health or body (especially from old age). <i>Old age and <b>infirmity</b> come to men and women alike.</i>
<b>item</b>	Used to introduce each item in a list. <i>He noticed an <b>item</b> in the New York Times.</i>
<b>lined</b>	Bordered by a line of things. <i>A sheet of <b>lined</b> paper.</i>
<b>material</b>	Having material or physical form or substance Benjamin Jowett. <i>He was university <b>material</b>.</i>
<b>overtax</b>	Require to pay too much tax. <i>The UK is not <b>overtaxed</b> compared to other countries.</i>
<b>packing</b>	The action or process of packing something. <i>Polystyrene <b>packing</b>.</i>
<b>panacea</b>	The goddess of healing; daughter of Aesculapius and sister of Hygeia. <i>The <b>panacea</b> for all corporate ills.</i>
<b>physical</b>	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. <i>The <b>physical</b> characteristics of the earth.</i>
<b><u>qualitative</u></b>	(of an adjective) describing the quality of something in size, appearance, value, etc. Such adjectives can be submodified by words such as very and have comparative and superlative forms. <i>A <b>qualitative</b> change in the undergraduate curriculum.</i>
<b>qualitatively</b>	In a qualitative manner. <i>Security levels can be <b>qualitatively</b> assessed.</i>
<b>stratum</b>	A surface on which an organism grows or is attached. <i>A geological <b>stratum</b>.</i>

<b>textile</b>	Artifact made by weaving or felting or knitting or crocheting natural or synthetic fibers. <i>A fascinating range of pottery jewellery and <b>textiles</b>.</i>
<b>valance</b>	A decorative framework to conceal curtain fixtures at the top of a window casing.
<b>vinyl</b>	A vinyl record. <i>The <b>vinyl</b> is cut to size with a craft knife.</i>
<b>weft</b>	(in weaving) the crosswise threads on a loom that are passed over and under the warp threads to make cloth. <i><b>Weft</b> threads.</i>
