| blue | Blue clothes or material. <i>The dark blue of his eyes.</i> |
| cheerless | Gloomy; depressing. <i>Something cheerless about the room.</i> |
| dejected | Affected or marked by low spirits. <i>He stood in the street looking dejected.</i> |
| depressed | Lower than previously. <i>A depressed fracture of the skull.</i> |
| despairing | Arising from or marked by despair or loss of hope. <i>He gave a despairing little shrug.</i> |
| despondent | Without or almost without hope. <i>She grew more and more despondent.</i> |
| dictionary | A reference book containing an alphabetical list of words with information about them. <i>The dictionary definition of smile.</i> |
| dingy | Discolored by impurities; not bright and clear is often used in combination. <i>A dirty or dingy white.</i> |
| diphthong | A digraph representing the sound of a diphthong or single vowel as in feat. |
| dismal | Causing a mood of gloom or depression. <i>The dismal weather made the late afternoon seem like evening.</i> |
| dispirited | Marked by low spirits; showing no enthusiasm. <i>She was determined to appear unworried in front of her dispirited family.</i> |
| downcast | Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>You mustn t be downcast.</i> |

| dreary | Depressingly dull and bleak or repetitive. <i>The dreary round of working eating and trying to sleep.</i> |
| etymology | The origin of a word and the historical development of its meaning. <i>The decline of etymology as a linguistic discipline.</i> |
| <u>gloomy</u> | Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>A gloomy corridor badly lit by oil lamps.</i> |
| grammar | A book on grammar. <i>Chomskyan grammar.</i> |
| <u>grim</u> | Causing dejection. <i>Grim laughter.</i> |
| joyless | Not giving or feeling any pleasure or satisfaction; grim or dismal. <i>She had to face the thought of a joyless future.</i> |
| <u>melancholy</u> | A humor that was once believed to be secreted by the kidneys or spleen and to cause sadness and melancholy. <i>A dark melancholy young man with deep set eyes.</i> |
| orthography | The study of spelling and how letters combine to represent sounds and form words. <i>A spoken language which has as yet no sanctioned orthography.</i> |
| <u>parse</u> | An act of parsing a string or a text. <i>A failed parse was retried.</i> |
| sadden | Cause to feel sorrow; make unhappy. <i>The news of her death saddened me.</i> |
| <u>sorry</u> | In a poor or pitiful state. <i>Sorry I was trying not to make a noise.</i> |
| <u>spelling</u> | Forming words with letters according to the principles underlying accepted usage. <i>The books and spelling in my class were too simple.</i> |
| sulky | Expressing or suggesting gloom and bad temper. <i>Disappointment was making her sulky.</i> |
| sullen | A sulky or depressed mood. <i>A sullen sunless sky.</i> |
| <u>syntax</u> | A set of rules for or an analysis of the syntax of a language. <i>Generative syntax.</i> |
| unhappy | Unfortunate. <i>The unhappy or sad news.</i> |
| vocabulary | A listing of the words used in some enterprise. <i>The term became part of business vocabulary.</i> |
