## Some as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Some" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “some” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *To some extent; quite a lot.*
- *(of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct.*
- *Imprecise but fairly close to correct.*



## Synonyms of "Some" as an adverb (17 Words)

<b>a little</b>	Not much.
<b>a little bit</b>	Not much.
<b>about</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>In just <b>about</b> a minute.</i>
<b>approximately</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>A journey of <b>approximately</b> two hours.</i>
<b>around</b>	All around or on all sides. <i>News gets <b>around</b> or about.</i>
<b>close to</b>	Near in time or place or relationship.
<b>in some measure</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>just about</b>	Absolutely.
<b>more or less</b>	Used to form the comparative of some adjectives and adverbs.
<b>or so</b>	Subsequently or soon afterward often used as sentence connectors.

<b>quite</b>	To a certain or fairly significant extent or degree; fairly. <b>Quite</b> ill.
<b>rather</b>	Instead of; as opposed to. <i>She seemed indifferent <b>rather</b> than angry.</i>
<b>roughly</b>	With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>The narrative is <b>roughly</b> speaking contemporary with the earliest of the gospels.</i>
<b>to some degree</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
<b>to some extent</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
<b>up to a point</b>	To a more central or a more northerly place.
<b>within limits</b>	On the inside.



## Usage Examples of "Some" as an adverb

- *Some forty people came.*
- *He needs feeding up some.*



## Associations of "Some" (30 Words)

- about** In the area or vicinity.  
*In just **about** a minute.*
- almost** Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.  
*The baby was **almost** asleep when the alarm sounded.*
- approximately** (of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct.  
*A journey of **approximately** two hours.*
- around** All around or on all sides.  
*Word got **around** that he was on the verge of retirement.*
- bit** The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press.  
*Miranda could go off and do her theatrical **bit**.*
- equidistant** At equal distances.  
*The line joins together all points which are **equidistant** from the two axes.*

<b><u>exaggerate</u></b>	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth. <i>He was apt to <b>exaggerate</b> any aches and pains.</i>
<b><u>fairly</u></b>	Actually (used to emphasize something surprising or extreme). <i>I was <b>fairly</b> certain she had nothing to do with the affair.</i>
<b><u>few</u></b>	The minority of people; the elect. <i>Art is not just for the <b>few</b>.</i>
<b><u>fractional</u></b>	Small or tiny in amount. <i><b>Fractional</b> crystallization.</i>
<b><u>half</u></b>	Half a pint of beer or a similar drink. <i>I am <b>half</b> inclined to believe you.</i>
<b><u>handful</u></b>	The quantity that can be held in the hand. <i>Only a <b>handful</b> of responses were received.</i>
<b><u>intersect</u></b>	Meet at a point. <i>The area is <b>intersected</b> only by minor roads.</i>
<b><u>least</u></b>	Used in names of very small animals and plants e.g. least shrew. <i>The garter snake is the <b>least</b> dangerous snake.</i>
<b><u>less</u></b>	Comparative of little. <i><b>Less</b> than three weeks.</i>
<b><u>little</u></b>	Small and of little importance. <i>A <b>little</b> puppy dog.</i>
<b><u>minimal</u></b>	The least possible. <i>A <b>minimal</b> charge for the service.</i>
<b><u>minimum</u></b>	The point on a curve where the tangent changes from negative on the left to positive on the right. <i>This can be done with the <b>minimum</b> amount of effort.</i>
<b><u>nearly</u></b>	Very close to; almost. <i>In the absence of anyone more <b>nearly</b> related I was designated next of kin.</i>
<b><u>partially</u></b>	Only in part; to a limited extent. <i>He was <b>partially</b> paralyzed.</i>
<b><u>portion</u></b>	Serve (food) in an amount suitable for one person. <i>Burger joints offering huge <b>portions</b>.</i>
<b><u>practically</u></b>	Virtually; almost. <i>He might win pointed out Emmeline <b>practically</b>.</i>
<b><u>preferably</u></b>	More readily or willingly. <i>He would like a place of his own <b>preferably</b> outside the town.</i>
<b><u>rarefaction</u></b>	Reduction in the density of something, especially air or a gas. <i>A series of <b>rarefactions</b> and compactions.</i>

- rather** Used to suggest that the opposite of a previous statement is the case; on the contrary.  
*We were **rather** hoping you might do that for us.*
- roughly** With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly.  
*This is a walk of **roughly** 13 miles.*
- several** Of an indefinite number more than 2 or 3 but not many.  
*Specialists in their **several** fields.*
- slightly** To a small degree or extent.  
*A **slightly** built girl.*
- smattering** A small amount of something.  
*A **smattering** of snow.*
- somewhat** To a moderately sufficient extent or degree.  
*His arguments were **somewhat** self contradictory.*
