**now and again** Used to preface a command or reproof or request.

now and then

In the historical present; at this point in the narration of a series of past

events.

Sporadically and infrequently.

Very **occasionally** the condition can result in death.

**off and on** No longer on or in contact or attached.

once in a while On one occasion.

In a sporadic manner.

**periodically** The lamps were **periodically** switched on and off at 30 minute

intervals.

In an unsystematic way, through partial measures taken over a period

**piecemeal** of time.

Many organizations have been built up **piecemeal**.

With spasms.

**spasmodically** The mouth was slightly open and jerked violently and **spasmodically** at

one corner.

To a meager degree or in a meager manner.

These voices are **meagerly** represented at the conference.

occasional Occurring, appearing, or done infrequently and irregularly.

The **occasional** car went by but no taxis.

occasionally Now and then or here and there.

Open areas are only **occasionally** interrupted by clumps of trees.

oft Many times at short intervals.

We **oft**en met over a cup of coffee.

often Frequently; many times.

Vocabulary **often** reflects social standing.

oftentimes Frequently; many times.

Sensory processing is **oftentimes** a challenge for someone with ASD.
