- *To a moderately sufficient extent or degree.*
- *To a moderate extent or by a moderate amount; rather.*



Synonyms of "Somewhat" as an adverb (21 Words)

a little	Not much.
a little bit	Not much.
<u>comparatively</u>	To a moderate degree as compared to something else; relatively. <i>Inflation was comparatively low.</i>
<u>fairly</u>	In conformity with the rules or laws and without fraud or cheating. <i>He is fairly clever with computers.</i>
in some measure	To or toward the inside of.
<u>jolly</u>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>He is jolly busy.</i>
marginally	In a marginal manner. <i>He is marginally worse than he was.</i>
middling	To certain extent or degree. <i>Middling rich.</i>
<u>moderately</u>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Both hotels are moderately priced.</i>
more or less	Comparative of much; to a greater degree or extent.

passably	In a way that is just good enough; reasonably. <i>He was passably attractive.</i>
pretty	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>He looked pretty fit for his age.</i>
quite	Of an unusually noticeable or exceptional or remarkable kind (not used with a negative). <i>This is quite a different problem.</i>
rather	To a degree (not used with a negative). <i>I rather think he wants me to marry him.</i>
reasonably	In a sensible way. <i>Ski wear which looks good and is reasonably priced.</i>
relatively	Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite. <i>They were very poor but relatively speaking they had been lucky.</i>
slightly	To a small degree or extent. <i>Slightly built.</i>
to some degree	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
to some extent	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
up to a point	To a more central or a more northerly place.
within limits	On the inside.

Usage Examples of "Somewhat" as an adverb

- *A somewhat thicker book.*
- *His arguments were somewhat self-contradictory.*
- *Matters have improved somewhat since then.*

bit	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>He had a bit of good luck.</i>
camouflage	Hide or disguise the presence of a person animal or object by means of camouflage. <i>The troops camouflaged themselves before they went into enemy territory.</i>

<u>comparatively</u>	To a moderate degree as compared to something else; relatively. <i>Inflation was comparatively low.</i>
<u>exaggerate</u>	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth. <i>He was apt to exaggerate any aches and pains.</i>
<u>fairly</u>	To certain extent or degree. <i>I was fairly certain she had nothing to do with the affair.</i>
<u>few</u>	The RAF pilots who took part in the Battle of Britain. <i>A world that increasingly belongs to the few.</i>
<u>girlfriend</u>	Any female friend. <i>Mary and her girlfriend organized the party.</i>
intersect	Divide (something) by passing or lying across it. <i>Lines of latitude and longitude intersect at right angles.</i>
least	Used in names of very small animals and plants e.g. least shrew. <i>He has the least talent of anyone.</i>
<u>less</u>	Of lower rank or importance. <i>Less quickly.</i>
little	Informal small and of little importance. <i>I'm tired of your petty little schemes.</i>
<u>minimum</u>	The least possible. <i>Minimum wage.</i>
<u>moderately</u>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Growth continues moderately.</i>
overdo	Do, use, or carry to excess; exaggerate. <i>I'd overdone the garlic in the curry.</i>
<u>overlap</u>	A part or amount which overlaps. <i>Two new series overlapped.</i>
part	Go one's own way; move apart. <i>Hold the furthest part of your leg that you can reach.</i>
<u>partially</u>	Only in part; to a limited extent. <i>A partially open door.</i>
partly	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>I felt partly to blame.</i>
<u>portion</u>	The allotment of some amount by dividing something. <i>They portioned the meat perfectly.</i>
preferably	More readily or willingly. <i>He would like a place of his own preferably outside the town.</i>

<u>pretty</u>	Make pretty or attractive. <i>He looked pretty fit for his age.</i>
<u>rather</u>	More readily or willingly. <i>He didn't call rather or instead he wrote her a letter.</i>
<u>ravishing</u>	Delightful; entrancing. <i>A ravishing blonde.</i>
<u>reasonably</u>	To a moderate or acceptable degree; fairly. <i>A constable who reasonably believes a breach of the peace is about to take place.</i>
<u>resemble</u>	Appear like; be similar or bear a likeness to. <i>They resembled each other closely.</i>
<u>section</u>	Divide into sections. <i>The New York Times business section.</i>
<u>sector</u>	The minimum track length that can be assigned to store information unless otherwise specified a sector of data consists of 512 bytes. <i>He was helpless in an important sector of his life.</i>
<u>slightly</u>	To a small degree or extent. <i>The children argued because one slice of cake was slightly larger than the other.</i>
<u>some</u>	To some extent quite a lot. <i>Having some friends over.</i>
<u>wee</u>	A short time. <i>The lyrics are a wee bit too sweet and sentimental.</i>
