- *To certain extent or degree.*
- *To a moderately sufficient extent or degree.*
- *To a moderate extent or by a moderate amount; rather.*



## Synonyms of "Somewhat" as an adverb (21 Words)

<b>a little</b>	Not much.
<b>a little bit</b>	Not much.
<b><u>comparatively</u></b>	To a moderate degree as compared to something else; relatively. <i>Inflation was <b>comparatively</b> low.</i>
<b><u>fairly</u></b>	In conformity with the rules or laws and without fraud or cheating. <i>He is <b>fairly</b> clever with computers.</i>
<b>in some measure</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b><u>jolly</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>He is <b>jolly</b> busy.</i>
<b>marginally</b>	In a marginal manner. <i>He is <b>marginally</b> worse than he was.</i>
<b>middling</b>	To certain extent or degree. <i><b>Middling</b> rich.</i>
<b><u>moderately</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Both hotels are <b>moderately</b> priced.</i>
<b>more or less</b>	Comparative of much; to a greater degree or extent.

<b>passably</b>	In a way that is just good enough; reasonably. <i>He was <b>passably</b> attractive.</i>
<b>pretty</b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>He looked <b>pretty</b> fit for his age.</i>
<b>quite</b>	Of an unusually noticeable or exceptional or remarkable kind (not used with a negative). <i>This is <b>quite</b> a different problem.</i>
<b>rather</b>	To a degree (not used with a negative). <i>I <b>rather</b> think he wants me to marry him.</i>
<b>reasonably</b>	In a sensible way. <i>Ski wear which looks good and is <b>reasonably</b> priced.</i>
<b>relatively</b>	Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite. <i>They were very poor but <b>relatively</b> speaking they had been lucky.</i>
<b>slightly</b>	To a small degree or extent. <i><b>Slightly</b> built.</i>
<b>to some degree</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
<b>to some extent</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
<b>up to a point</b>	To a more central or a more northerly place.
<b>within limits</b>	On the inside.

<b>bit</b>	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>He had a <b>bit</b> of good luck.</i>
<b>camouflage</b>	Hide or disguise the presence of a person animal or object by means of camouflage. <i>The troops <b>camouflaged</b> themselves before they went into enemy territory.</i>

<u>few</u>	The RAF pilots who took part in the Battle of Britain. <i>A world that increasingly belongs to the <b>few</b>.</i>
<u>girlfriend</u>	Any female friend. <i>Mary and her <b>girlfriend</b> organized the party.</i>
<u>intersect</u>	Divide (something) by passing or lying across it. <i>Lines of latitude and longitude <b>intersect</b> at right angles.</i>
<u>least</u>	Used in names of very small animals and plants e g least shrew. <i>He has the <b>least</b> talent of anyone.</i>
<u>less</u>	Of lower rank or importance. <i><b>Less</b> quickly.</i>
<u>little</u>	Informal small and of little importance. <i>I m tired of your petty <b>little</b> schemes.</i>
<u>minimum</u>	The least possible. <i><b>Minimum</b> wage.</i>
<u>moderately</u>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Growth continues <b>moderately</b>.</i>
<u>overdo</u>	Do, use, or carry to excess; exaggerate. <i>I d <b>overdone</b> the garlic in the curry.</i>
<u>overlap</u>	A part or amount which overlaps. <i>Two new series <b>overlapped</b>.</i>
<u>part</u>	Go one s own way move apart. <i>Hold the furthest <b>part</b> of your leg that you can reach.</i>
<u>partially</u>	Only in part; to a limited extent. <i>A <b>partially</b> open door.</i>
<u>partly</u>	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>I felt <b>partly</b> to blame.</i>
<u>portion</u>	The allotment of some amount by dividing something. <i>They <b>portioned</b> the meat perfectly.</i>
<u>preferably</u>	More readily or willingly. <i>He would like a place of his own <b>preferably</b> outside the town.</i>

<u>pretty</u>	Make pretty or attractive. <i>He looked <b>pretty</b> fit for his age.</i>
<u>rather</u>	More readily or willingly. <i>He didn't call <b>rather</b> or instead he wrote her a letter.</i>
<u>ravishing</u>	Delightful; entrancing. <i>A <b>ravishing</b> blonde.</i>
<u>reasonably</u>	To a moderate or acceptable degree; fairly. <i>A constable who <b>reasonably</b> believes a breach of the peace is about to take place.</i>
<u>resemble</u>	Appear like; be similar or bear a likeness to. <i>They <b>resembled</b> each other closely.</i>
<u>section</u>	Divide into sections. <i>The New York Times business <b>section</b>.</i>
<u>sector</u>	The minimum track length that can be assigned to store information unless otherwise specified a sector of data consists of 512 bytes. <i>He was helpless in an important <b>sector</b> of his life.</i>
<u>slightly</u>	To a small degree or extent. <i>The children argued because one slice of cake was <b>slightly</b> larger than the other.</i>
<u>some</u>	To some extent quite a lot. <i>Having <b>some</b> friends over.</i>
<u>wee</u>	A short time. <i>The lyrics are a <b>wee</b> bit too <b>sweet</b> and sentimental.</i>
