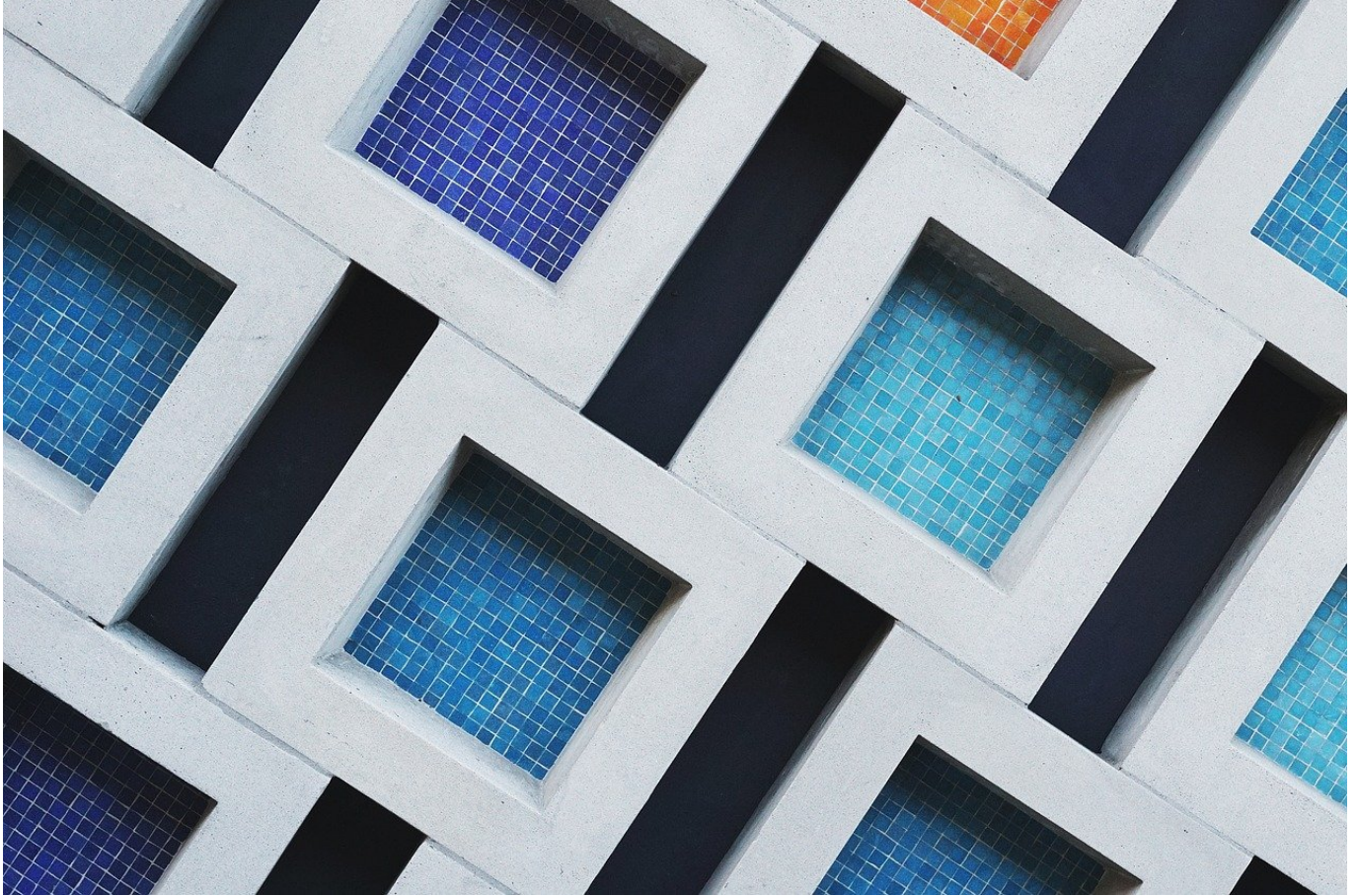

- *Grouping by class or kind or size.*
- *An operation that segregates items into groups according to a specified criterion.*
- *The basic cognitive process of arranging into classes or categories.*



Synonyms of "Sorting" as a noun (4 Words)

categorisation The basic cognitive process of arranging into classes or categories.

categorization The act of distributing things into classes or categories of the same type.
***Categorization** by topic.*

classification The act of distributing things into classes or categories of the same type.
*New **classifications** for drivers of commercial vehicles.*

sort An approximate definition or example.
*In law also the Judge is in a **sort** superior to his King.*



Usage Examples of "Sorting" as a noun

- *The bottleneck in mail delivery is the process of sorting.*



Associations of "Sorting" (30 Words)

- allocate** Distribute according to a plan or set apart for a special purpose.
*Students are **allocated** accommodation on a yearly basis.*
- allot** Administer or bestow, as in small portions.
*I was **allotted** a little room in the servants block.*
- apportion** Distribute according to a plan or set apart for a special purpose.
*They did not **apportion** blame or liability to any one individual.*
- assign** Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person.
*It is difficult to decide whether to **assign** the victory to Godwin.*
- assortment** A miscellaneous collection of things or people.
*A great **assortment** of cars was on display.*
- asunder** Into parts or pieces.
*Those whom God hath joined together let no man put **asunder**.*

| classification | The arrangement of animals and plants in taxonomic groups according to their observed similarities (including at least kingdom and phylum in animals, division in plants, and class, order, family, genus, and species. <i>The classification of disease according to symptoms.</i> |
| dispense | Distribute or provide (a service or information) to a number of people. <i>The machine dispenses soft drinks.</i> |
| disperse | Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>Storms can disperse seeds via high altitudes.</i> |
| <u>dispersion</u> | Spreading widely or driving off. <i>Some seeds rely on birds for dispersion.</i> |
| <u>disseminate</u> | Spread (something, especially information) widely. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can disseminate and migrate.</i> |
| dissemination | The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate. <i>The dissemination of public information.</i> |
| <u>distinguish</u> | Mark as different. <i>The child is perfectly capable of distinguishing reality from fantasy.</i> |
| distribute | Distribute or disperse widely. <i>The middle term must be distributed at least once in the premises.</i> |
| distribution | The commercial activity of transporting and selling goods from a producer to a consumer. <i>Strength has two ingredients high cards and distribution.</i> |
| division | Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>A retail division.</i> |
| <u>equally</u> | In amounts or parts that are the same in size. <i>They split their winnings equally.</i> |
| handout | A piece of printed information provided free of charge, especially to accompany a lecture or advertise something. <i>Dependence on central government handouts.</i> |
| hierarchic | Classified according to various criteria into successive levels or layers. <i>In her hierarchic set of values honesty comes first.</i> |
| <u>hierarchical</u> | Classified according to various criteria into successive levels or layers. <i>It has been said that only a hierarchical society with a leisure class at the top can produce works of art.</i> |
| miscellany | An anthology of short literary pieces and poems and ballads etc. <i>A miscellany of houses.</i> |

| nomenclature | The devising or choosing of names for things, especially in a science or other discipline. <i>The students found it hard to decipher the nomenclature of chemical compounds.</i> |
| propagate | Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>Propagate these characteristics.</i> |
| share | Have give or receive a share of. <i>The two countries share a long border.</i> |
| sort | A person of a particular character or nature. <i>She served a creamy sort of dessert thing.</i> |
| spread | A tasty mixture to be spread on bread or crackers or used in preparing other dishes. <i>A double page spread.</i> |
| stratified | Socially hierarchical. <i>A stratified society in which political power and influence still lay in the hands of the landed class.</i> |
| tag | Attach a monitoring tag to. <i>Scrawled felt tip tags on city walls.</i> |
| taxonomy | A classification of organisms into groups based on similarities of structure or origin etc. <i>The taxonomy of these fossils.</i> |
| variety | A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>The range and variety of his work is amazing.</i> |
