## Associations of "Sought after" (30 Words)

<b>accompanying</b>	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>The <b>accompanying</b> documentation.</i>
<b>afterthought</b>	An addition that was not included in the original plan. <i>As an <b>afterthought</b> she said Thank you.</i>
<b><u>afterward</u></b>	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>It didn't happen until <b>afterward</b>.</i>
<b><u>afterwards</u></b>	At a later or future time. <i>The offender was arrested shortly <b>afterwards</b>.</i>
<b><u>back</u></b>	The part of a garment that covers a person's back. <i>He <b>backed</b> the Mercedes into the yard.</i>
<b>backwards</b>	In reverse of the usual direction or order. <i>Count <b>backwards</b> from twenty to ten.</i>
<b>behind</b>	A kick that sends the ball over a behind line or a touch that sends it between the inner posts scoring one point. <i>England were still 382 runs <b>behind</b>.</i>
<b>chase</b>	Drive or cause to go in a specified direction. <i>He <b>chased</b> down the motorway.</i>
<b><u>concomitant</u></b>	Occurring with or following as a consequence. <i><b>Concomitant</b> with his obsession with dirt was a desire for order.</i>
<b><u>consequently</u></b>	(sentence connectors) because of the reason given. <i>Flexible workers find themselves in great demand and <b>consequently</b> gain high salaries.</i>
<b><u>ensuing</u></b>	Following immediately and as a result of what went before. <i>She lost track of one of her children during the <b>ensuing</b> chaos.</i>
<b>following</b>	Immediately following in time or order. <i>The crowd of <b>following</b> cars made the occasion seem like a parade.</i>

<b>lag</b>	Cover with lagging to prevent heat loss. <i>A time <b>lag</b> between infection and symptoms.</i>
<b>latency</b>	The time that elapses between a stimulus and the response to it. <i>Subscribers can expect some <b>latency</b> time when issuing a request.</i>
<b>later</b>	Coming at a subsequent time or stage. <i><b>Later</b> medical science could have saved the child.</i>
<b>next</b>	The next person or thing. <i>On Tuesday <b>next</b>.</i>
<b>passing</b>	In sport the action of passing a ball to another team member. <i>The <b>passing</b> of the Cold War.</i>
<b>posterior</b>	Relating to or denoting presentation of a fetus in which the rear or caudal end is nearest the cervix and emerges first at birth. <i>A basal body situated just <b>posterior</b> to the nucleus.</i>
<b>pursuit</b>	An auxiliary activity. <i>The Olympic <b>pursuit</b> champion.</i>
<b>rear</b>	Located in or toward the back or rear. <i>Infantrymen were in the <b>rear</b>.</i>
<b>sequent</b>	Following in a sequence or as a logical conclusion. <i>Some of the inferences are not <b>sequent</b> on the premises.</i>
<b>shortly</b>	Abruptly, sharply, or curtly. <i>The new database will <b>shortly</b> be available for consultation.</i>
<b>so</b>	Subsequently or soon afterward often used as sentence connectors. <i>That s <b>so</b> not fair.</i>
<b>subsequence</b>	Following in time. <i>An affair which appeared in due <b>subsequence</b> in the newspapers.</i>
<b>subsequent</b>	Coming after something in time; following. <i>The theory was developed <b>subsequent</b> to the earthquake of 1906.</i>
<b>subsequently</b>	After a particular thing has happened; afterwards. <i>He apologized <b>subsequently</b>.</i>
<b>successively</b>	In proper order or sequence. <i>He served <b>successively</b> as a major and a lieutenant colonel.</i>
<b>then</b>	In that case; therefore. <i>The <b>then</b> president.</i>
<b>therefore</b>	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion therefore adv as a consequence. <i>He was injured and <b>therefore</b> unable to play.</i>
