acetify	To subject to acetous fermentation in the manufacture of vinegar; to convert into vinegar.
acidify	Turn acidic. <i>Pollutants can acidify surface water.</i>
acidulate	Make slightly acidic. <i>Add two or three bits of lemon peel to acidulate the water.</i>
<u>alienate</u>	Arouse hostility or indifference in where there had formerly been love, affection, or friendliness. <i>They defended the Masai against attempts to alienate their land.</i>
anger	Fill someone with anger provoke anger in. <i>She was angered by his terse answer.</i>
be detrimental to	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
<u>blight</u>	Cause to suffer a blight. <i>Some people complain that wind farms blight the landscape.</i>
colour	Change the colour of something by painting dyeing or shading it. <i>Surprise coloured her voice.</i>

damage	Inflict damage upon. <i>The car was badly damaged in the accident.</i>
disaffect	Arouse hostility or indifference in where there had formerly been love, affection, or friendliness. <i>What these ads do is disaffect the voting public.</i>
disenchant	Free from enchantment. <i>He may have been disenchanted by the loss of his huge following.</i>
disillusion	Cause (someone) to realize that a belief they hold is false. <i>If they think we have a magic formula to solve the problem don't disillusion them.</i>
dissatisfy	Fail to satisfy. <i>What is it about these words that dissatisfies you?</i>
embitter	Make (someone) feel bitter or resentful. <i>These injustices embittered her even more.</i>
envenom	Add poison to. <i>Tribal rivalries envenom the bitter civil war.</i>
exasperate	Exasperate or irritate. <i>This futile process exasperates prison officers.</i>
ferment	Cause the fermentation of a substance. <i>We ferment the grapes for a very long time to achieve high alcohol content.</i>
frustrate	Treat cruelly. <i>It frustrated me that more couldn't be done for her.</i>
harm	Cause or do harm to. <i>This could harm his World Cup prospects.</i>
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. <i>Does acupuncture hurt.</i>
impair	Make worse or less effective. <i>His vision was impaired.</i>
make bitter	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
make resentful	Charge with a function; charge to be.
mar	Impair the quality or appearance of; spoil. <i>Violence marred a number of New Year celebrations.</i>
poison	Administer poison to a person or animal either deliberately or accidentally. <i>The bombings poisoned the political atmosphere and deepened the social divide.</i>

spoil	(of food) become unfit for eating. <i>A series of political blunders spoilt their chances of being re elected.</i>
<u>tarnish</u>	Make or become less valuable or respected. <i>The silver was tarnished by the long exposure to the air.</i>
turn	To break and turn over earth especially with a plow. <i>We turned round and headed back to the house.</i>
upset	Make (someone) unhappy, disappointed, or worried. <i>The dam will upset the ecological balance.</i>
work	Set to or keep at work. <i>The political candidate worked the crowds.</i>
<u>worsen</u>	Make or become worse. <i>Her condition worsened on the flight.</i>
<u>wreck</u>	Suffer or undergo shipwreck. <i>An eye injury wrecked his chances of a professional career.</i>

curmudgeonly	(especially of an old person) bad-tempered and negative. <i>A curmudgeonly old man.</i>

dark	Of a person having dark skin hair or eyes. <i>A dark secret.</i>
disagreeable	Unpleasant to interact with. <i>Aspects of his work are disagreeable to him.</i>
distasteful	Causing dislike or aversion; disagreeable or unpleasant. <i>Distasteful language.</i>
dour	Showing a brooding ill humor. <i>The proverbially dour New England Puritan.</i>
embittered	Angry or resentful at having been treated unfairly. <i>He died an embittered man.</i>
false	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e g false oat. <i>False teeth.</i>
fractious	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>Rockets were much too fractious to be tested near thickly populated areas.</i>
fretful	Nervous and unable to relax. <i>A constant fretful stamping of hooves.</i>
glowering	Showing a brooding ill humor.
glum	Looking or feeling dejected; morose. <i>A glum hopeless shrug.</i>
gone bad	Well in the past; former.
gone off	No longer retained.
irascible	Quickly aroused to anger. <i>An irascible and difficult man.</i>
irritable	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>The seeds have been reputed to help conditions such as irritable bladder.</i>
moody	Showing a brooding ill humor- Bruce Bli. <i>Grainy film which gives a soft moody effect.</i>
morose	Sullen and ill-tempered. <i>She was morose and silent when she got home.</i>
nasty	Exasperatingly difficult to handle or circumvent. <i>Life has a nasty habit of repeating itself.</i>
off	Located on the side of a vehicle that is normally furthest from the kerb offside. <i>Even the greatest athletes have off days.</i>
off-key	Inaccurate in pitch.

peevish	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A thin peevish voice.</i>
pettish	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>He comes across in his journal entries as spoiled and pettish.</i>
<u>petulant</u>	(of a person or their manner) childishly sulky or bad-tempered. <i>He was moody and petulant.</i>
pungent	(of comment, criticism, or humour) having a sharp and caustic quality. <i>The pungent smell of frying onions.</i>
rancid	(used of decomposing oils or fats) having a rank smell or taste usually due to a chemical change or decomposition. <i>Without preservatives fat goes rancid.</i>
<u>resentful</u>	Full of or marked by resentment or indignant ill will. <i>He was angry and resentful of their intrusion.</i>
saturnine	(of a person or their features) dark in colouring and moody or mysterious. <i>A saturnine temperament.</i>
<u>sharp</u>	Ending in a sharp point. <i>Her face was thin and her nose sharp.</i>
smarting	Capable of independent and apparently intelligent action. <i>Susan rubbed her smarting eyes.</i>
spiteful	Showing or caused by malice. <i>A truly spiteful child.</i>
stinging	Characterized by a sharp tingling or burning sensation. <i>A stinging pain.</i>
sullen	(of the sky) full of dark clouds. <i>A sullen crowd.</i>
turned	(of a phrase or verse) expressed in a specified manner. <i>The carefully turned words of great writers.</i>

lemon	A distinctive tart flavor characteristic of lemons. <i>A lemon T shirt.</i>
luscious	Appealing strongly to the senses; pleasingly rich. <i>The luscious brush strokes and warm colours of these late masterpieces.</i>
palatable	(of an action or proposal) acceptable or satisfactory. <i>A device that made increased taxation more palatable.</i>
pungency	Wit having a sharp and caustic quality. <i>He commented with typical pungency.</i>
pungent	(of comment, criticism, or humour) having a sharp and caustic quality. <i>He has expressed some fairly pungent criticisms.</i>
salt	Sprinkle as if with salt. <i>After stuffing the fish I salted and peppered it.</i>
