Synonyms of "Spacious" as an adjective (24 Words)

airy	Having little or no perceptible weight; so light as to resemble air. A large airy room.
ample	Enough or more than enough; plentiful. <i>Of ample proportions.</i>
big	Generous and understanding and tolerant. A heart big enough to hold no grudges.
broad	Broad in scope or content. The valley is three miles long and half a mile broad .
capacious	Large in capacity. She rummaged in her capacious handbag.
commodious	Large and roomy (`convenient' is archaic in this sense. They moved to a more commodious dwelling.
<u>expansive</u>	Marked by exaggerated feelings of euphoria and delusions of grandeur. <i>The expansive force of fire.</i>



extensive	(of agriculture) obtaining a relatively small crop from a large area with a minimum of capital and labour. An extensive Roman settlement in northwest England.
generous	More than adequate. Unusually generous in his judgment of people.
high-ceilinged	Having a higher than normal ceiling.
immense	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. The Los Angeles aqueduct winds like an immense snake along the base of the mountains.
large	Fairly large or important in effect influential. Many large investors are likely to take a different view.
open	Of a note sounded from an open string or pipe. <i>Keep your eyes open</i> .
palatial	Resembling a palace in being spacious and splendid. <i>Her palatial apartment in Mayfair.</i>
<u>rambling</u>	(of e.g. speech and writing) tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects. <i>Rambling</i> forest paths.
rolling	Uttered with a trill. A rolling ball.
roomy	(especially of accommodation) having plenty of room; spacious. A roomy but sparsely furnished apartment.
sizeable	Fairly large in size. A sizeable apartment.
<u>substantial</u>	Fairly large. A mere dream neither substantial nor practical.
<u>sweeping</u>	Wide in range or effect. <i>Sweeping</i> desolate moorlands.
vast	Of very great extent or quantity; immense. <i>The vast reaches of outer space.</i>
voluminous	(of clothes) very loose or full; having much fabric. <i>He sank into a voluminous armchair.</i>
<u>wide</u>	(after a measurement and in questions) from side to side. <i>His wide circle of friends.</i>
wide open	Not on target.

abundantly	Extremely. They were abundantly supplied with food.
adequacy	The quality of being sufficient for the end in view. <i>He questioned the adequacy of the usual sentimental interpretation of the</i> <i>Golden Rule.</i>
adequate	About average; acceptable. She had adequate training.
<u>airy</u>	Characterized by lightness and insubstantiality; as impalpable or intangible as air. <i>Airy theories about socioeconomic improvement.</i>



ample	Enough or more than enough; plentiful. An ample supply of consumer goods.
big	In a major way. As a senior in college he was a big man on campus.
bountiful	Giving generously. The ocean provided a bountiful supply of fresh food.
<u>breadth</u>	The extent of something from side to side. The boat measured 27 feet in breadth .
broad	Showing or characterized by broad mindedness. A broad lawn.
capacious	Having a lot of space inside; roomy. She carried a capacious bag.
commodious	Roomy and comfortable. A commodious building suitable for conventions.
<u>copious</u>	Affording an abundant supply. <i>Copious</i> provisions.
<u>expanse</u>	A wide scope. The moth has a wing expanse of 20 to 24 mm.
extensive	Of agriculture; increasing productivity by using large areas with minimal outlay and labor. <i>Extensive</i> farming techniques.
<u>extensively</u>	To a large or detailed degree. Her husband travelled extensively in his job.
huge	Extremely large; enormous. <i>Huge</i> popular demand for higher education.
large	Fairly large or important in effect influential. A big or large barn.
<u>lounge</u>	A sitting room in a house. A TV lounge .
opened	Used of mouth or eyes. <i>His mouth slightly opened</i> .
panoramic	As from an altitude or distance. A panoramic view.
roomy	(of buildings and rooms) having ample space. Roomy trousers.
<u>sizable</u>	Fairly large in size. A sizable fortune.



sufficiency	Self sufficiency or independence of character especially of an arrogant or imperious sort. <i>He questioned the sufficiency of human intelligence.</i>
<u>sufficient</u>	Of a quantity that can fulfill a need or requirement but without being abundant. They had sufficient resources to survive.
<u>swath</u>	The space created by the swing of a scythe or the cut of a mowing machine.
vast	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>At vast or immense expense.</i>
<u>vista</u>	A mental view of a succession of remembered or anticipated events. Vista s of freedom seemed to open ahead of him.
voluminous	Large in volume or bulk. A subject of voluminous legislation.
<u>wide</u>	A ball that is judged to be too wide of the stumps for the batsman to play for which an extra is awarded to the batting side. <i>How wide</i> do you think this house is.
wingspan	Linear distance between the extremities of an airfoil. An eagle with a wingspan of 7 ft.
