Synonyms of "Spacious" as an adjective (24 Words)

airy	Having little or no perceptible weight; so light as to resemble air. <i>A large airy room.</i>
ample	Enough or more than enough; plentiful. <i>Of ample proportions.</i>
big	Generous and understanding and tolerant. <i>A heart big enough to hold no grudges.</i>
broad	Broad in scope or content. <i>The valley is three miles long and half a mile broad.</i>
capacious	Large in capacity. <i>She rummaged in her capacious handbag.</i>
commodious	Large and roomy ('convenient' is archaic in this sense). <i>They moved to a more commodious dwelling.</i>
expansive	Marked by exaggerated feelings of euphoria and delusions of grandeur. <i>The expansive force of fire.</i>

extensive	(of agriculture) obtaining a relatively small crop from a large area with a minimum of capital and labour. <i>An extensive Roman settlement in northwest England.</i>
generous	More than adequate. <i>Unusually generous in his judgment of people.</i>
high-ceilinged	Having a higher than normal ceiling.
immense	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. <i>The Los Angeles aqueduct winds like an immense snake along the base of the mountains.</i>
large	Fairly large or important in effect influential. <i>Many large investors are likely to take a different view.</i>
open	Of a note sounded from an open string or pipe. <i>Keep your eyes open.</i>
palatial	Resembling a palace in being spacious and splendid. <i>Her palatial apartment in Mayfair.</i>
<u>rambling</u>	(of e.g. speech and writing) tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects. <i>Rambling forest paths.</i>
rolling	Uttered with a trill. <i>A rolling ball.</i>
roomy	(especially of accommodation) having plenty of room; spacious. <i>A roomy but sparsely furnished apartment.</i>
sizeable	Fairly large in size. <i>A sizeable apartment.</i>
<u>substantial</u>	Fairly large. <i>A mere dream neither substantial nor practical.</i>
<u>sweeping</u>	Wide in range or effect. <i>Sweeping desolate moorlands.</i>
vast	Of very great extent or quantity; immense. <i>The vast reaches of outer space.</i>
voluminous	(of clothes) very loose or full; having much fabric. <i>He sank into a voluminous armchair.</i>
<u>wide</u>	(after a measurement and in questions) from side to side. <i>His wide circle of friends.</i>
wide open	Not on target.

*They were **abundantly** supplied with food.*
- adequacy** The quality of being sufficient for the end in view.
*He questioned the **adequacy** of the usual sentimental interpretation of the Golden Rule.*
- adequate** About average; acceptable.
*She had **adequate** training.*
- airy** Characterized by lightness and insubstantiality; as impalpable or intangible as air.
***Airy** theories about socioeconomic improvement.*

ample	Enough or more than enough; plentiful. <i>An ample supply of consumer goods.</i>
big	In a major way. <i>As a senior in college he was a big man on campus.</i>
bountiful	Giving generously. <i>The ocean provided a bountiful supply of fresh food.</i>
breadth	The extent of something from side to side. <i>The boat measured 27 feet in breadth.</i>
broad	Showing or characterized by broad mindedness. <i>A broad lawn.</i>
capacious	Having a lot of space inside; roomy. <i>She carried a capacious bag.</i>
commodious	Roomy and comfortable. <i>A commodious building suitable for conventions.</i>
copious	Affording an abundant supply. <i>Copious provisions.</i>
expanse	A wide scope. <i>The moth has a wing expanse of 20 to 24 mm.</i>
extensive	Of agriculture; increasing productivity by using large areas with minimal outlay and labor. <i>Extensive farming techniques.</i>
extensively	To a large or detailed degree. <i>Her husband travelled extensively in his job.</i>
huge	Extremely large; enormous. <i>Huge popular demand for higher education.</i>
large	Fairly large or important in effect influential. <i>A big or large barn.</i>
lounge	A sitting room in a house. <i>A TV lounge.</i>
opened	Used of mouth or eyes. <i>His mouth slightly opened.</i>
panoramic	As from an altitude or distance. <i>A panoramic view.</i>
roomy	(of buildings and rooms) having ample space. <i>Roomy trousers.</i>
sizable	Fairly large in size. <i>A sizable fortune.</i>

- sufficiency** Self sufficiency or independence of character especially of an arrogant or imperious sort.
*He questioned the **sufficiency** of human intelligence.*
- sufficient** Of a quantity that can fulfill a need or requirement but without being abundant.
*They had **sufficient** resources to survive.*
- swath** The space created by the swing of a scythe or the cut of a mowing machine.
- vast** Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope.
*At **vast** or immense expense.*
- vista** A mental view of a succession of remembered or anticipated events.
***Vistas** of freedom seemed to open ahead of him.*
- voluminous** Large in volume or bulk.
*A subject of **voluminous** legislation.*
- wide** A ball that is judged to be too wide of the stumps for the batsman to play for which an extra is awarded to the batting side.
*How **wide** do you think this house is.*
- wingspan** Linear distance between the extremities of an airfoil.
*An eagle with a **wingspan** of 7 ft.*
