plain	Lacking patterns especially in color. <i>It is <b>plain</b> that he is no reactionary.</i>
redundant	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>This <b>redundant</b> brewery has been converted into a library.</i>
scanty	Lacking in magnitude or quantity. <i>A <b>scanty</b> harvest.</i>
<u>second</u>	Coming next after the first in position in space or time or degree or magnitude. <i>The <b>second</b> violins.</i>
<u>slender</u>	Being of delicate or slender build. <i>A <b>slender</b> majority of four.</i>

<b><u>substitute</u></b>	Serving or used in place of another. <b>Substitute</b> coffee.
<b>supererogatory</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>It was <b>supererogatory</b> of her to gloat.</i>
<b>superfluous</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
<b>supernumerary</b>	Present in excess of the normal or requisite number. <i>Extra ribs as well as other <b>supernumerary</b> internal parts.</i>
<b>supplementary</b>	Functioning in a supporting capacity. <i>The programme offers <b>supplementary</b> information about the news.</i>
<b><u>surplus</u></b>	More than what is needed or used; excess. <b>Surplus</b> cheese distributed to the needy.
<b>surplus to requirements</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required.
<b>trim</b>	Neat and smart in appearance. <i>She has a <b>trim</b> athletic figure.</i>
<b>unallocated</b>	(of resources or duties) not yet allocated. <i>2 8 m of contingency funds remained <b>unallocated</b>.</i>
<b>unbooked</b>	Not reserved in advance. <i>There are seven seats left <b>unbooked</b>.</i>
<b>unchartered</b>	(of an area of land or sea) not mapped or surveyed. <i>These are <b>unchartered</b> waters.</i>
<b>unembellished</b>	Not embellished or decorated. <b>Unembellished</b> white walls.
<b>unoccupied</b>	Not leased to or occupied by a tenant. <b>Unoccupied</b> areas of France.

<b>oversupply</b>	Supply with an excess of. <i>An <b>oversupply</b> of teachers.</i>
<b>padding</b>	Soft material such as foam or cloth used to pad or stuff something. <i>Avoid waffle or <b>padding</b> in your essay.</i>
<b><u>plethora</u></b>	An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood. <i>Allen won a <b>plethora</b> of medals during his illustrious career.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>He found the narrative too <b>prolix</b> and discursive.</i>
<b>redundance</b>	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
<b>redundant</b>	Not or no longer needed or useful; superfluous. <i>At the risk of being <b>redundant</b> I return to my original proposition.</i>
<b>subsidiary</b>	A company that is completely controlled by another company. <i>All the firm's <b>subsidiary</b> companies have to operate under broad general guidelines.</i>
<b><u>summation</u></b>	A summary. <i>The <b>summation</b> of numbers of small pieces of evidence.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>supererogatory</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>It was <b>supererogatory</b> of her to gloat.</i>
<b>superfluity</b>	Extreme excess. <i>A <b>superfluity</b> of unoccupied time.</i>
<b>superfluous</b>	Unnecessary, especially through being more than enough. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
<b>supernumerary</b>	A supernumerary person or thing. <i><b>Supernumerary</b> ornamentation.</i>
<b>supplementary</b>	A supplementary person or thing. <i>The programme offers <b>supplementary</b> information about the news.</i>
<b>surfeit</b>	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>I am <b>surfeited</b> with shopping.</i>

- surplus** An amount of something left over when requirements have been met; an excess of production or supply.  
*She had picked up her boots in an army **surplus** store.*
- unessential** Not basic or fundamental.  
*A train has broken down resulting in a call to postpone all **unessential** travel.*
- unnecessary** Unnecessary things.  
*Some people feel that holiday insurance is **unnecessary**.*
- unoccupied** Not leased to or occupied by a tenant.  
*An **unoccupied** telephone booth.*
- verbiage** Excessively lengthy or technical speech or writing.  
*The basic idea here despite all the **verbiage** is simple.*
