<u>own</u>	Done or produced by and for the person mentioned. <i>The style had its own charm.</i>
plain	Lacking patterns especially in color. <i>It is plain that he is no reactionary.</i>
redundant	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>This redundant brewery has been converted into a library.</i>
scanty	Lacking in magnitude or quantity. <i>A scanty harvest.</i>
<u>second</u>	Coming next after the first in position in space or time or degree or magnitude. <i>The second violins.</i>
<u>slender</u>	Being of delicate or slender build. <i>A slender majority of four.</i>

<u>substitute</u>	Serving or used in place of another. Substitute coffee.
supererogatory	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>It was supererogatory of her to gloat.</i>
superfluous	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for superfluous information.</i>
supernumerary	Present in excess of the normal or requisite number. <i>Extra ribs as well as other supernumerary internal parts.</i>
supplementary	Functioning in a supporting capacity. <i>The programme offers supplementary information about the news.</i>
<u>surplus</u>	More than what is needed or used; excess. Surplus cheese distributed to the needy.
surplus to requirements	More than is needed, desired, or required.
trim	Neat and smart in appearance. <i>She has a trim athletic figure.</i>
unallocated	(of resources or duties) not yet allocated. <i>2 8 m of contingency funds remained unallocated.</i>
unbooked	Not reserved in advance. <i>There are seven seats left unbooked.</i>
unchartered	(of an area of land or sea) not mapped or surveyed. <i>These are unchartered waters.</i>
unembellished	Not embellished or decorated. Unembellished white walls.
unoccupied	Not leased to or occupied by a tenant. Unoccupied areas of France.
unornamented	Not having any decoration. <i>Functional architecture featuring stark unornamented concrete.</i>
untaken	Not taken by force; not captured. <i>Hard decisions have been left untaken.</i>
<u>vacant</u>	Without an occupant or incumbent. A vacant stare.

redundance	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
redundant	Not or no longer needed or useful; superfluous. <i>At the risk of being redundant I return to my original proposition.</i>
subsidiary	A company that is completely controlled by another company. <i>All the firm's subsidiary companies have to operate under broad general guidelines.</i>
<u>summation</u>	A summary. <i>The summation of numbers of small pieces of evidence.</i>
superabundance	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
supererogatory	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>It was supererogatory of her to gloat.</i>
superfluity	Extreme excess. <i>A superfluity of unoccupied time.</i>
superfluous	Unnecessary, especially through being more than enough. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for superfluous information.</i>
supernumerary	A supernumerary person or thing. <i>Supernumerary ornamentation.</i>
supplementary	A supplementary person or thing. <i>The programme offers supplementary information about the news.</i>
surfeit	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>I am surfeited with shopping.</i>

*She had picked up her boots in an army **surplus** store.*
- unessential** Not basic or fundamental.
*A train has broken down resulting in a call to postpone all **unessential** travel.*
- unnecessary** Unnecessary things.
*Some people feel that holiday insurance is **unnecessary**.*
- unoccupied** Not leased to or occupied by a tenant.
*An **unoccupied** telephone booth.*
- verbiage** Excessively lengthy or technical speech or writing.
