## Associations of "Speak up" (30 Words)

<b>ascending</b>	The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>Incomes ranked in <b>ascending</b> order of size.</i>
<b>babble</b>	The continuous murmuring sound of flowing water. <i>They <b>babbled</b> on about their holiday.</i>
<b>chatter</b>	Cut unevenly with a chattering tool. <i>His teeth were <b>chattering</b>.</i>
<a href="#">climb</a>	The act of climbing something. <i>The air became colder as they <b>climbed</b> higher.</i>
<a href="#">communicative</a>	Able or tending to communicate- W.M.Thackeray. <i>The <b>communicative</b> process in literary texts.</i>
<b>dialog</b>	A literary composition in the form of a conversation between two people.
<a href="#">dialogue</a>	Provide a film or play with a dialogue. <i>Interfaith <b>dialogue</b>.</i>
<b>elevator</b>	A shoe with a raised insole designed to make the wearer appear taller. <i>In the <b>elevator</b> she pressed the button for the lobby.</i>
<b>gibberish</b>	Unintelligible talking. <i>He talks <b>gibberish</b>.</i>
<a href="#">glib</a>	Marked by lack of intellectual depth. <i>A <b>glib</b> response to a complex question.</i>
<a href="#">hoist</a>	Lifting device for raising heavy or cumbersome objects. <i>A white flag was <b>hoisted</b>.</i>
<b>loquacious</b>	Tending to talk a great deal; talkative. <i>Never <b>loquacious</b> Sarah was now totally lost for words.</i>
<b>maunder</b>	Move or act in a dreamy or idle manner. <i>He <b>maunders</b> through the bank composing his thoughts.</i>

<u><a href="#">murmur</a></u>	An abnormal sound of the heart; sometimes a sign of abnormal function of the heart valves. <i>The distant <b>murmur</b> of traffic.</i>
<u><a href="#">narrative</a></u>	The practice or art of telling stories. <i><b>Narrative</b> poetry.</i>
<b>orate</b>	Talk pompously. <i>Lend me your ears Fred <b>orated</b>.</i>
<b>palaver</b>	Have a lengthy discussion, usually between people of different backgrounds. <i>Getting into each building was a bit of a <b>palaver</b>.</i>
<b>prattle</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>She began to <b>prattle</b> on about her visit to the dentist.</i>
<b>recitative</b>	Musical declamation of the kind usual in the narrative and dialogue parts of opera and oratorio, sung in the rhythm of ordinary speech with many words on the same note. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Make mention of. <i>Tom s looking peaky she <b>remarked</b>.</i>
<b>risen</b>	(of e.g. celestial bodies) above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
<b>rising</b>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>The <b>rising</b> temperature.</i>
<b>speech</b>	The act of delivering a formal spoken communication to an audience. <i>Antony s <b>speech</b> over Caesar s body.</i>
<u><a href="#">spoken</a></u>	Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination. <i>A soft <b>spoken</b> person.</i>
<b>talk</b>	Persuade or cause someone to do something by talking. <i>He s all <b>talk</b>.</i>
<b>talking</b>	The action of talking speech or discussion. <i>He did have <b>talking</b> eyes.</i>
<b>tell</b>	Reveal (information) to someone in a non-verbal way. <i>He could <b>tell</b> that she was unhappy.</i>
<b>uphill</b>	Against difficulties. <i>Follow the track <b>uphill</b>.</i>
<b>upward</b>	To a later time. <i>A general <b>upward</b> movement of fish.</i>

**verbosity**

An expressive style that uses excessive or empty words.  
*A critic with a reputation for **verbosity**.*
