haranguer	A public speaker who delivers a loud or forceful or angry speech.
lecturer	A public lecturer at certain universities. <i>A senior lecturer in surgery at Leeds University.</i>
loudspeaker	Electro-acoustic transducer that converts electrical signals into sounds loud enough to be heard at a distance. <i>A muffled announcement is made over the loudspeaker.</i>
loudspeaker system	An organized structure for arranging or classifying.
orator	A person who delivers a speech or oration. <i>A theatrically effective orator.</i>
public speaker	People in general considered as a whole.
rhetorician	An expert in formal rhetoric. <i>They re ready to listen to any smooth tongued rhetorician.</i>

speechifier	A person who delivers a speech or oration.

verbaliser	Someone who expresses in language; someone who talks (especially someone who delivers a public speech or someone especially garrulous.
verbalizer	Someone who expresses in language; someone who talks (especially someone who delivers a public speech or someone especially garrulous.

confabulate	Fabricate imaginary experiences as compensation for loss of memory. <i>She could be heard on the telephone confabulating with someone.</i>
confer	Have a conference in order to talk something over. <i>The Minister may have exceeded the powers conferred on him by Parliament.</i>
conference	Take part in a conference or conference call. <i>I conferenced with a senior analyst at the Congressional Research Service.</i>
consult	An act of consulting a professional a consultation. <i>If you consult a solicitor making a will is a simple procedure.</i>
debate	Argue with one another. <i>There has been much debate about prices.</i>
declamation	The action or art of declaiming. <i>Shakespearean declamation.</i>
declamatory	Vehement or impassioned in expression. <i>A long declamatory speech.</i>
dialog	The lines spoken by characters in drama or fiction.
dialogue	Provide a film or play with a dialogue. <i>Passages of dialogue.</i>
discourse	Carry on a conversation. <i>She could discourse at great length on the history of Europe.</i>
discuss	Speak with others about something talk something over in detail have a discussion. <i>They were discussing where to go for a drink.</i>
discussion	An exchange of views on some topic. <i>The book contains an excellent discussion of modal logic.</i>
disputation	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>Scholastic disputations.</i>
elocution	An expert manner of speaking involving control of voice and gesture. <i>Lessons in singing and elocution.</i>
eloquent	Clearly expressing or indicating something. <i>The bus journey alone is eloquent of class inequality.</i>
flowing	(of a line or contour) smoothly continuous. <i>A long flowing gown of lavender silk.</i>
fluent	(of a foreign language) spoken accurately and with facility. <i>His style of play was fast and fluent.</i>

forum	(in an ancient Roman city) a public square or marketplace used for judicial and other business. <i>We hope these pages act as a forum for debate.</i>
<u>glib</u>	(of words or a speaker) fluent but insincere and shallow. <i>A glib tongue.</i>
<u>guest</u>	A person staying at a hotel or guest house. <i>A reduction for guests staying seven nights or more.</i>
interlocutor	The performer in the middle of a minstrel line who engages the others in talk.
oration	The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>He delivered an oration on the decline of family values.</i>
oratory	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a society of priests without vows, especially the Oratory of St Philip Neri founded in 1564. <i>He loved the sound of his own oratory.</i>
persuasive	Good at persuading someone to do or believe something through reasoning or the use of temptation. <i>A most persuasive speaker.</i>
prompting	A cue given to a performer (usually the beginning of the next line to be spoken). <i>The audience could hear his prompting.</i>
recitative	A vocal passage of narrative text that a singer delivers with natural rhythms of speech. <i>Singing in recitative.</i>
talk	The act of giving a talk to an audience. <i>We need to talk Maggie.</i>
talker	A person who speaks or converses, often in a specified way. <i>She s quite a talker conversing and arguing with Henry.</i>
