- A spearman.
- A long pointed rod used as a tool or weapon.
- A plant shoot, especially a pointed stem of asparagus or broccoli.
- An implement with a shaft and barbed point used for catching fish.

<u>blade</u>	Something long and thin resembling a blade of grass. The director a young <b>blade</b> in an oversized suit.
bud	Cannabis. In certain limbless lizards and snakes a limb <b>bud</b> develops.
cutting	The action of cutting something. The <b>cutting</b> of the cake.
fishgig	An implement with a shaft and barbed point used for catching fish.
fizgig	A firework that fizzes as it moves.
gig	Tender that is a light ship's boat; often for personal use of captain. They played a <b>gig</b> in New Jersey.
harpoon	A barbed missile resembling a spear that is attached to a long rope and thrown by hand or fired from a gun, used for catching whales and other large sea creatures.
javelin	An athletic competition in which a javelin is thrown as far as possible. <i>His nearest rival in the <b>javelin</b></i> .
<u>knife</u>	A weapon with a handle and blade with a sharp point.
lance	A weapon resembling a lance used in hunting fish or whales. The warriors bore <b>lance</b> s tipped with iron or steel.
offshoot	A natural consequence of development. <i>Commercial <b>offshoot</b>s of universities.</i>
pike	Medieval weapon consisting of a spearhead attached to a long pole or pikestaff superseded by the bayonet.
runner	A plant that spreads by means of runners. The original <b>runner</b> s for the Booker Prize.
scion	A descendant of a notable family. A <b>scion</b> of royal stock.
shaft	A remark intended to be witty, wounding, or provoking. A <b>shaft</b> of sunlight.
sprig	A small branch or division of a branch (especially a terminal division); usually applied to branches of the current or preceding year. A <b>sprig</b> of the French nobility.
<u>sprout</u>	Any new growth of a plant such as a new branch or a bud. <i>The flower pots are full of green</i> <b>sprout</b> s.
sucker	Hard candy on a stick. A tape recorder was attached to the phone with a rubber <b>sucker</b> .



#### **sword** Military power, violence, or destruction. Not many perished by the **sword**.

**tendril** Something resembling a plant tendril especially a slender curl or ringlet of hair. *The wind fitfully moved the dark tendrils around her forehead.*

### Definitions of "Spear" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "spear" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Thrust up like a spear.
- Pierce with a spear.
- Pierce or strike with a spear or other pointed object.





## Synonyms of "Spear" as a verb (24 Words)

<u>bore</u>	Cause to be bored. The drill can <b>bore</b> through rock.
incise	Cut (skin or flesh) with a surgical instrument. Figures <b>incise</b> d on upright stones.
<u>jab</u>	Strike or punch with quick and short blows. He <b>jab</b> bed the piece of meat with his pocket knife.
jag	Cut teeth into make a jagged cutting edge. She <b>jag</b> ged herself in the mouth.
<u>knife</u>	Cut or move cleanly through something with a knife like action. A shard of steel <b>knife</b> d through the mainsail.

needle	Prick or pierce with or as if with a needle. <i>He <b>needle</b>d her with his sarcastic remarks.</i>
nick	Cut a nick into. He had <b>nick</b> ed himself while shaving.
perforate	Make a hole into or between, as for ease of separation. The walls will be <b>perforate</b> d with thousands of circular openings.
<u>pierce</u>	Make a hole in (the ears or other part of the body) so as to wear jewellery in them. A splinter had <b>pierce</b> d the skin.
pin	Attach or fasten with a pin or pins. Richards <b>pin</b> ned him down until the police arrived.
punch	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. The nail <b>punch</b> ed through the wall.
puncture	Sustain a puncture. One of the knife blows had <b>puncture</b> d a lung.
put a hole in	Formulate in a particular style or language.
riddle	Separate with a riddle as grain from chaff. The bullets <b>riddle</b> d his body.
<u>rupture</u>	(especially of a pipe or container, or bodily part such as an organ or membrane) break or burst suddenly. <i>If the main artery <b>rupture</b>s he could die.</i>
skewer	Drive a skewer through. Politicians are used to being <b>skewer</b> ed.
slit	Form one s eyes into slits squint. <i>Slit</i> ted eyes.
spear up	Thrust up like a spear.
<u>spike</u>	Render a gun useless by plugging up the vent with a spike. <i>He doubted they would <b>spike</b> the entire effort over this one negotiation.</i>
<u>spit</u>	Rain gently. It began to <b>spit</b> .
<u>stab</u>	Stab or pierce. A sharp end of wicker <b>stab</b> bed into his sole.
stick	Stick to firmly. <i>Stick</i> the poster onto the wall.

javelin	An athletic competition in which a javelin is thrown as far as possible. <i>His nearest rival in the <b>javelin</b>.</i>
<u>knife</u>	Stab someone with a knife. A shard of steel <b>knife</b> d through the mainsail.
lance	Open by piercing with a lancet. The teenager had been <b>lance</b> d by a wooden splinter.
lancet	Shaped like a lancet arch. A <b>lancet</b> clock.
mace	An official who carries a mace of office.
pointed	Having a sharpened or tapered tip or end. A <b>pointed</b> allusion to what was going on.
<u>poke</u>	Prod and stir a fire with a poker to make it burn more fiercely. <i>He</i> <b>poke</b> d Benny in the ribs and pointed.
prickle	Cause a tingling sensation in. I hate the way the fibres <b>prickle</b> your skin.
scabbard	A sheath for a sword or dagger or bayonet. A ceremonial sword hung at his side in a gilded <b>scabbard</b> .
scissors	Denoting an action in which two things cross each other or open and close like the blades of a pair of scissors. A dummy <b>scissors</b> from David Thomas deceived the opposition.
<u>spike</u>	Bring forth a spike or spikes. His hair was matted and <b>spike</b> d with blood.
spinous	Having spines. The dorsal fin is <b>spinous</b> .
<u>stake</u>	A pole or stake set up to mark something as the start or end of a race track. A <b>stake</b> in the company s future.
sticker	A small sharp-pointed tip resembling a spike on a stem or leaf. <i>Warning <b>sticker</b>s on the glass.</i>
<u>sword</u>	One of the suits in a tarot pack. Not many perished by the <b>sword</b> .
<u>thorn</u>	A thorny bush shrub or tree especially a hawthorn. The issue has become a <b>thorn</b> in renewing the peace talks.



tool	Furnish with tools. The factory must be <b>tool</b> ed to produce the models.
transfix	Pierce with a sharp stake or point. She stared at him <b>transfix</b> ed.
trident	A three-pronged spear, especially as an attribute of Poseidon (Neptune) or Britannia.
whaler	A seaman who works on a ship that hunts whales.
wire	Fasten with wire. They <b>wire</b> d his jaw.
