by design	So as to pass a given point.
consciously	In a deliberate and intentional way. <i>She consciously chose to ignore him.</i>
deliberately	With intention; in an intentional manner. <i>The fire was started deliberately.</i>
especially	Used to single out one person or thing over all others. <i>Sleep is especially important in growing children.</i>
in cold blood	To or toward the inside of.
intentionally	With intention; in an intentional manner. <i>I wasn't sure if it was intentionally funny or not.</i>

knowingly	In a way that suggests one has secret knowledge or awareness. <i>When a journalist knowingly misleads their readers.</i>
particularly	To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common. <i>He particularly asked that I should help you.</i>
peculiarly	More than usually; especially. <i>The town is peculiarly built.</i>
premeditatedly	With premeditation; deliberately.
wilfully	With the intention of causing harm; deliberately. <i>He had wilfully ignored the evidence.</i>
wittingly	With full knowledge and deliberation. <i>He wittingly deleted the references.</i>



Usage Examples of "Specially" as an adverb

- *A new coat and hat, bought specially.*
- *A specially commissioned report.*

- An especially (or specially) cautious approach to the danger.
- A specially arranged dinner.

- adapted** Changed in order to improve or made more fit for a particular purpose.
*Seeds precisely **adapted** to the area.*
- choose** Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives.
*I always **choose** the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.*
- chosen** Having been selected as the best or most appropriate.
*She was Mama s **chosen**.*
- competitively** In competition.
*They were clamouring **competitively** for her attention.*

elect	Selected as the best. <i>An elect circle of artists.</i>
elite	A group or class of people seen as having the most power and influence in a society, especially on account of their wealth or privilege. <i>The silent majority were looked down upon by the liberal elite.</i>
emphasis	Stress given to a word or words when speaking to indicate particular importance. <i>The red light gave the central figure increased emphasis.</i>
especial	Surpassing what is common or usual or expected. <i>These traditions are of especial interest to feminists.</i>
especially	Used to single out one person or thing over all others. <i>An especially or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i>
exceptionally	Only in unusual circumstances. <i>The court allows half an hour in most cases one hour exceptionally for a very important case.</i>
extraordinarily	In a very unusual or remarkable way. <i>He did a good job in extraordinarily difficult circumstances.</i>
flagrant	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. <i>Flagrant violation of human rights.</i>
hallmark	Stamp with a hallmark. <i>This attitude hallmarks many a Briton s behaviour abroad.</i>
idiosyncratic	Peculiar to the individual. <i>We all have our own idiosyncratic gestures.</i>
insofar	To the degree or extent that. <i>Insofar as it can be ascertained the horse lung is comparable to that of man.</i>
juncture	A particular point in events or time. <i>At such junctures he always had an impulse to leave.</i>
notably	In particular; especially. <i>Such a statement is notably absent from the government s proposals.</i>
particular	Used to single out an individual member of a specified group or class. <i>Universals can be simultaneously exemplified by different particulars in different places.</i>

particularly	Uniquely or characteristically- John Knowles. <i>He was particularly fussy about spelling.</i>
salience	The state of being salient. <i>The political salience of religion has a considerable impact.</i>
selected	Chosen in preference to another.
singular	Relating to or of the nature of singularity. <i>No explanation accompanied this rather singular statement.</i>
singularly	In a remarkable or noticeable way. <i>Charlotte thought her very singularly dressed.</i>
special	For a special service or occasion. <i>Customers queue for such specials as vegetable lasagne.</i>
specifically	In a way that is exact and clear; precisely. <i>Some collectors maintain spaces specifically to house their larger works of art.</i>
specificity	The extent to which a diagnostic test is specific for a particular condition, trait, etc. <i>The specificity of the antibody was checked.</i>
uncommon	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind J R Lowell. <i>Frost and floods are uncommon during these months.</i>
unique	A unique person or thing. <i>The situation was unique in British politics.</i>
