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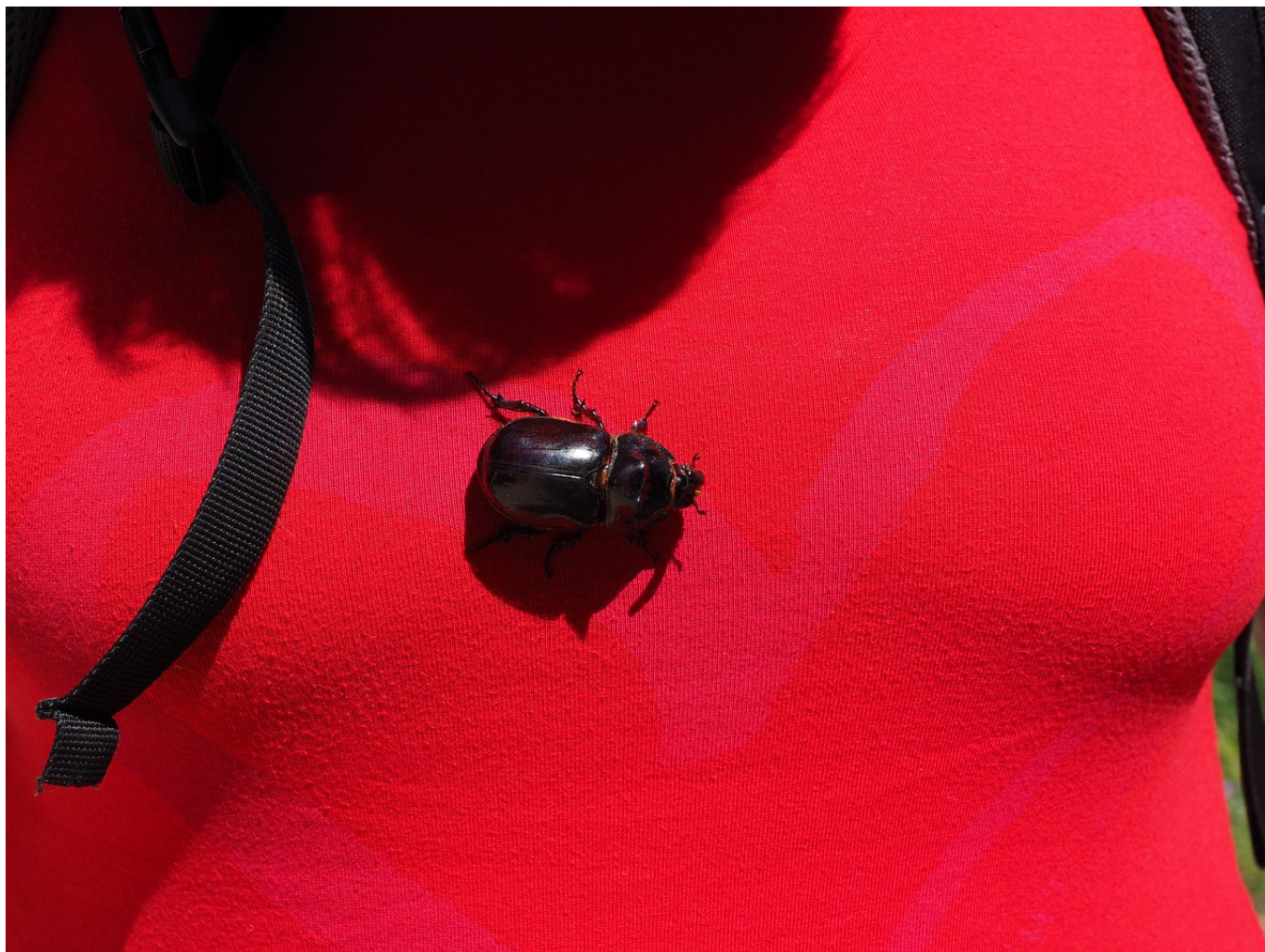

### Definitions of "Specially" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “specially” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common.*
- *In a special manner.*
- *For a special purpose.*



## Synonyms of "Specially" as an adverb (12 Words)

<b>by design</b>	So as to pass a given point.
<b>consciously</b>	In a deliberate and intentional way. <i>She <b>consciously</b> chose to ignore him.</i>
<b>deliberately</b>	With intention; in an intentional manner. <i>The fire was started <b>deliberately</b>.</i>
<b>especially</b>	Used to single out one person or thing over all others. <i>Sleep is <b>especially</b> important in growing children.</i>
<b>in cold blood</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>intentionally</b>	With intention; in an intentional manner. <i>I wasn't sure if it was <b>intentionally</b> funny or not.</i>



<b>knowingly</b>	In a way that suggests one has secret knowledge or awareness. <i>When a journalist <b>knowingly</b> misleads their readers.</i>
<b>particularly</b>	To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common. <i>He <b>particularly</b> asked that I should help you.</i>
<b>peculiarly</b>	More than usually; especially. <i>The town is <b>peculiarly</b> built.</i>
<b>premeditatedly</b>	With premeditation; deliberately.
<b>wilfully</b>	With the intention of causing harm; deliberately. <i>He had <b>wilfully</b> ignored the evidence.</i>
<b>wittingly</b>	With full knowledge and deliberation. <i>He <b>wittingly</b> deleted the references.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Specially" as an adverb

- *A new coat and hat, bought specially.*
- *A specially commissioned report.*

- An *especially* (or *specially*) cautious approach to the danger.
- A *specially* arranged dinner.

<b>adapted</b>	Changed in order to improve or made more fit for a particular purpose. <i>Seeds precisely <b>adapted</b> to the area.</i>
<b>choose</b>	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>I always <b>choose</b> the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.</i>
<u><b>chosen</b></u>	Having been selected as the best or most appropriate. <i>She was Mama s <b>chosen</b>.</i>
<b>competitively</b>	In competition. <i>They were clamouring <b>competitively</b> for her attention.</i>

<b>dispensation</b>	An act of divine providence. <i>Regulations controlling <b>dispensation</b> of medications.</i>
<b>egregious</b>	Outstandingly bad; shocking. <i>An <b>egregious</b> lie.</i>
<b><u>elect</u></b>	Selected as the best. <i>An <b>elect</b> circle of artists.</i>
<b>elite</b>	A group or class of people seen as having the most power and influence in a society, especially on account of their wealth or privilege. <i>The silent majority were looked down upon by the liberal <b>elite</b>.</i>
<b>emphasis</b>	Stress given to a word or words when speaking to indicate particular importance. <i>The red light gave the central figure increased <b>emphasis</b>.</i>
<b>especial</b>	Surpassing what is common or usual or expected. <i>These traditions are of <b>especial</b> interest to feminists.</i>
<b>especially</b>	Used to single out one person or thing over all others. <i>An <b>especially</b> or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i>
<b>exceptionally</b>	Only in unusual circumstances. <i>The court allows half an hour in most cases one hour <b>exceptionally</b> for a very important case.</i>
<b>extraordinarily</b>	In a very unusual or remarkable way. <i>He did a good job in <b>extraordinarily</b> difficult circumstances.</i>
<b>flagrant</b>	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. <i><b>Flagrant</b> violation of human rights.</i>
<b><u>hallmark</u></b>	Stamp with a hallmark. <i>This attitude <b>hallmarks</b> many a Briton's behaviour abroad.</i>
<b><u>idiosyncratic</u></b>	Peculiar to the individual. <i>We all have our own <b>idiosyncratic</b> gestures.</i>
<b>insofar</b>	To the degree or extent that. <i><b>Insofar</b> as it can be ascertained the horse lung is comparable to that of man.</i>
<b>junction</b>	A particular point in events or time. <i>At such <b>junctions</b> he always had an impulse to leave.</i>
<b><u>notably</u></b>	In particular; especially. <i>Such a statement is <b>notably</b> absent from the government's proposals.</i>
<b>particular</b>	Used to single out an individual member of a specified group or class. <i>Universals can be simultaneously exemplified by different <b>particulars</b> in different places.</i>

<b><u>particularly</u></b>	Uniquely or characteristically- John Knowles. <i>He was <b>particularly</b> fussy about spelling.</i>
<b>salience</b>	The state of being salient. <i>The political <b>salience</b> of religion has a considerable impact.</i>
<b>selected</b>	Chosen in preference to another.
<b><u>singular</u></b>	Relating to or of the nature of singularity. <i>No explanation accompanied this rather <b>singular</b> statement.</i>
<b>singularly</b>	In a remarkable or noticeable way. <i>Charlotte thought her very <b>singularly</b> dressed.</i>
<b>special</b>	For a special service or occasion. <i>Customers queue for such <b>specials</b> as vegetable lasagne.</i>
<b><u>specifically</u></b>	In a way that is exact and clear; precisely. <i>Some collectors maintain spaces <b>specifically</b> to house their larger works of art.</i>
<b>specificity</b>	The extent to which a diagnostic test is specific for a particular condition, trait, etc. <i>The <b>specificity</b> of the antibody was checked.</i>
<b>uncommon</b>	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind J R Lowell. <i>Frost and floods are <b>uncommon</b> during these months.</i>
<b>unique</b>	A unique person or thing. <i>The situation was <b>unique</b> in British politics.</i>
