delimit	Be opposite to; of angles and sides, in geometry. <i>Agreements delimiting fishing zones.</i>
delimitate	Determine the essential quality of.
delineate	Trace the shape of. <i>His finger found a precisely outlined section delineated in red marker.</i>
describe	Give a detailed account in words of. <i>The man was described as tall clean shaven and with short dark hair.</i>
designate	Decree or designate beforehand. <i>He was designated as prime minister.</i>
destine	Design or destine. <i>She was destined to become a great pianist.</i>
detail	Provide details for. <i>The report details proposals to improve public transport.</i>
determine	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>It will be her mental attitude that determines her future.</i>
draw up	Remove the entrails of.
enumerate	Specify individually. <i>She enumerated the many obstacles she had encountered.</i>
fix	Make fixed stable or stationary. <i>The club attempted to fix last Thursday s league match.</i>
frame	Enclose in a frame as of a picture. <i>He claims he was framed.</i>
identify	Identify as in botany or biology for example. <i>A system that ensures that the pupil's real needs are identified.</i>
instance	Cite (a fact, case, etc.) as an example. <i>I instanced Bob as someone whose commitment had certainly got things done.</i>
intend	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>She was intended to become the director.</i>
itemize	Place on a list of items. <i>Itemize one s tax deductions.</i>
limit	Restrict or confine within limits. <i>Limit the time you can spend with your friends.</i>
list	Give a building company etc listed status. <i>Am I listed in your register.</i>
nail down	Complete a pass.

<u>name</u>	Mention and identify by name. <i>The club have asked United to name their price for the striker.</i>
narrow	Make or become more narrow or restricted. <i>The Victoria Embankment was built to narrow the river.</i>
narrow down	Define clearly.
particularise	Be specific about.
particularize	Treat individually or in detail. <i>He was the first to particularize themes in the poetry.</i>
peg down	Bring down or defeat (an opponent).
pin down	Attach or fasten with pins or as if with pins.
<u>qualify</u>	Alter the strength or flavour of (something, especially a liquid). <i>A pensioner who does not qualify for income support.</i>
set	Put or set seeds seedlings or plants into the ground. <i>Set this poem to music.</i>
set apart	Get ready for a particular purpose or event.
set down	Put into a certain state; cause to be in a certain state.
set out	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use, event, etc.
specialise	Suit to a special purpose.
<u>specialize</u>	Suit to a special purpose. <i>He could specialize in tropical medicine.</i>
spell out	Write or name the letters that comprise the conventionally accepted form of (a word or part of a word).
state	Indicate through a symbol, formula, etc. <i>A bold theme is stated at the beginning driving the entire ten minute <i>allegro</i>.</i>
stipulate	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement; make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i>The will stipulates that she can live in the house for the rest of her life.</i>



Usage Examples of "Specify" as a verb

- *Naval architects specified circular portholes.*
- *The agency failed to specify that the workers were not their employees.*
- *Could you please specify your criticism of my paper?*
- *The coup leader promised an election but did not specify a date.*



Associations of "Specify" (30 Words)

- aforementioned** Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
*Works of all the **aforementioned** authors.*
- allude** (of an artist or a work of art) recall (an earlier work or style) in such a way as to suggest a relationship with it.
*The photographs **allude** to Italian Baroque painting.*
- allusion** The practice of making allusions.
*A classical **allusion**.*
- annotate** Provide interlinear explanations for words or phrases.
*He **annotated** on what his teacher had written.*
- citation** An official award (as for bravery or service) usually given as formal public statement.
*A Nobel **citation**.*
- cite** Refer to (a passage, book, or author) as evidence for or justification of an argument or statement, especially in a scholarly work.
*Authors who are highly regarded by their peers tend to be **cited**.*

declaim	Speak against in an impassioned manner. <i>He declaimed against the wasteful ways of modern society.</i>
define	Determine the nature of. <i>What defines a good wine.</i>
delineate	Represented accurately or precisely. <i>His finger found a precisely outlined section delineated in red marker.</i>
depict	Represent by a drawing, painting, or other art form. <i>Paintings depicting Old Testament scenes.</i>
describe	Identify as in botany or biology, for example. <i>Discreet Italian police described it in a manner typically continental.</i>
dictum	A formal pronouncement from an authoritative source. <i>The old dictum might is right.</i>
explain	Be the cause of or motivating factor for. <i>The committee explained their plan for fund raising to the Dean.</i>
explanation	The act of explaining; making something plain or intelligible. <i>The explanation was very simple.</i>
explicitly	In a clear and detailed manner, leaving no room for confusion or doubt. <i>The essay should state explicitly how the facts support the thesis.</i>
foregoing	Just mentioned or stated; preceding. <i>The foregoing analysis of the economic class structure.</i>
maxim	English inventor (born in the United States) who invented the Maxim gun that was used in World War I (1840-1916). <i>The maxim that actions speak louder than words.</i>
mention	Make mention of. <i>He received a special mention and a prize of 100.</i>
motto	A short sentence or phrase chosen as encapsulating the beliefs or ideals of an individual, family, or institution. <i>They were developing the use of leitmotifs or mottoes that appear throughout an opera.</i>
notation	A note or annotation. <i>He added a short notation to the address on the envelope.</i>
paraphrase	A rewording of something written or spoken. <i>It is characteristic of poetic metaphors that they are not susceptible to paraphrase.</i>
quotation	A price offered by a market-maker for the sale or purchase of a stock or other security. <i>Ensure you receive a written quotation covering all aspects of the job.</i>

quote	Put quote marks around. <i>A military spokesman was quoted as saying that the border was now quiet.</i>
refer	Of a word phrase or symbol describe or denote have as a referent. <i>There were lots of questions referring to her talk.</i>
reference	A letter from a previous employer testifying to someone's ability or reliability, used when applying for a new job. <i>References to Darwinism and evolution.</i>
specification	(patent law) a document drawn up by the applicant for a patent of invention that provides an explicit and detailed description of the nature and use of an invention. <i>One of the telescope's mirrors had been manufactured to incorrect specifications.</i>
state	Involving the ceremony associated with a head of state. <i>The Queen paid a state visit to Malaysia.</i>
stipulate	Make an oral contract or agreement in the verbal form of question and answer that is necessary to give it legal force. <i>He stipulated certain conditions before their marriage.</i>
talk	Deliver a lecture or talk. <i>Let's have more work and less talk around here.</i>
tin	An airtight sealed container for preserving food made of tinfoil or aluminium a can. <i>Albert got out the biscuit tin.</i>
