| pace | A unit of length equal to 3 feet; defined as 91.44 centimeters; originally taken to be the average length of a stride. <i>The pace of events accelerated.</i> |
| pep pill | Liveliness and energy. |
| promptness | The characteristic of doing things without delay. |
| <u>quickness</u> | A rate that is rapid. <i>His quickness of mind gained him the respect of all parties.</i> |
| rapidity | A rate that is rapid. <i>The fish sank into the sand with such rapidity that it must be seen to be believed.</i> |
| rate | A quantity or amount or measure considered as a proportion of another quantity or amount or measure. <i>Buying up sites at a rate of one a month.</i> |
