| acronym | An abbreviation formed from the initial letters of other words and pronounced as a word (e.g. ASCII, NASA). <i>The word scuba is an acronym for s elf c ontained u nderwater b reathing a pparatus.</i> |
| alliterate | Use alliteration as a form of poetry. <i>His first and last names alliterated.</i> |
| alphabet | The elementary stages of any subject (usually plural). <i>The first letter of the alphabet.</i> |
| antonym | A word that expresses a meaning opposed to the meaning of another word in which case the two words are antonyms of each other. <i>To him the antonym of gay was depressed.</i> |
| apostrophe | A punctuation mark (') used to indicate either possession (e.g. Harry's book; boys' coats) or the omission of letters or numbers (e.g. can't; he's; 1 Jan. '99). |
| bewitchment | A magical spell. |
| collocation | The habitual juxtaposition of a particular word with another word or words with a frequency greater than chance. <i>The collocation of the two pieces.</i> |
| correction | A change that rectifies an error or inaccuracy. <i>The correction of his vision with eye glasses.</i> |
| dictionary | A reference book containing an alphabetical list of words with information about them. <i>The worm attempts to crack account passwords using a built in dictionary.</i> |
| diphthong | A digraph representing the sound of a diphthong or single vowel as in feat. |
| etymology | The origin of a word and the historical development of its meaning. <i>The decline of etymology as a linguistic discipline.</i> |

| grammar | A grammar school. <i>Chomskyan grammar.</i> |
| homonym | Two words are homonyms if they are pronounced and spelled the same way but have different meanings. |
| <u>indent</u> | An indenture. <i>Every indent in the coastline.</i> |
| indentation | The act of cutting into an edge with toothlike notches or angular incisions. <i>Coastal indentations.</i> |
| orthography | A method of representing the sounds of a language by written or printed symbols. <i>A spoken language which has as yet no sanctioned orthography.</i> |
| paragraph | Divide into paragraphs as of text. <i>All her friends were paragraphed in last Monday s paper.</i> |
| <u>parse</u> | Analyze syntactically by assigning a constituent structure to (a sentence). <i>I asked a couple of students to parse these sentences for me.</i> |
| punctuation | Something that makes repeated and regular interruptions or divisions. <i>Satisfactory standards of handwriting spelling grammar and punctuation.</i> |
| quotation | A passage or expression that is quoted or cited. <i>Ensure you receive a written quotation covering all aspects of the job.</i> |
| <u>rhetoric</u> | Language designed to have a persuasive or impressive effect, but which is often regarded as lacking in sincerity or meaningful content. <i>All we have from the Opposition is empty rhetoric.</i> |
| runic | Relating to or consisting of runes. |
| sentence | Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>His sentence was 5 to 10 years.</i> |
| <u>syntax</u> | A set of rules for or an analysis of the syntax of a language. <i>Generative syntax.</i> |
| typo | A typographical error. |
| typographic | Relating to or occurring or used in typography. <i>The typographic art.</i> |
| ungrammatical | Not conforming to grammatical rules. <i>Ungrammatical sentences.</i> |
| vocabulary | A list of difficult or unfamiliar words with an explanation of their meanings, accompanying a piece of specialist or foreign-language text. <i>He introduced a wide vocabulary of techniques.</i> |

A letter representing a vowel sound such as a e i o u.

word
