## Spew as a Verb

### Definitions of "Spew" as a verb

- *Expel large quantities of (something) rapidly and forcibly.*
- *Expel or eject (saliva or phlegm or sputum) from the mouth.*
- *Be poured or forced out in large quantities.*
- *Eject or send out in large quantities, also metaphorical.*



## Synonyms of "Spew" as a verb (38 Words)

- be sick** Happen, occur, take place.
- belch out** Be made known; be disclosed or revealed.
- cast** Form by pouring e.g. wax or hot metal into a cast or mold.  
*Cast a bronze sculpture.*
- cat** Beat with a cat o' nine tails.  
*I kept her off the wind and sailing free until I had the anchor **catted**.*
- chuck** (of a bowler) deliver (a ball) with an unlawful action.  
*He **chucked** the letter in the bin.*
- discharge** Go off or discharge.  
*When you shoot you can **discharge** as many barrels as you wish.*
- disgorge** (of a building or vehicle) discharge (the occupants).  
*The combine **disgorged** a steady stream of grain.*

<b>eject</b>	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>Plants utilize carbon dioxide in the atmosphere that animals <b>eject</b>.</i>
<b>emit</b>	Expel (gases or odors). <i>She <b>emitted</b> a sound like laughter.</i>
<b>eruct</b>	Emit stomach gas noisily through the mouth; belch.
<b>expel</b>	Eliminate (a substance). <i>He was <b>expelled</b> from his native country.</i>
<b>fetch up</b>	Take away or remove.
<b>gush</b>	Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet. <i>Water <b>gushed</b> forth.</i>
<b>honk</b>	Make or cause to make a honk. <i>The geese were <b>honking</b>.</i>
<b>jet</b>	Travel by jet aircraft. <i>Blood <b>jett</b>ed from his nostrils.</i>
<b>pour</b>	Pour out. <i>Water <b>poured</b> off the roof.</i>
<b>pour out</b>	Pour out.
<b>ptyalise</b>	Expel or eject (saliva or phlegm or sputum) from the mouth.
<b>ptyalize</b>	Expel or eject (saliva or phlegm or sputum) from the mouth.
<b>puke</b>	Eject the contents of the stomach through the mouth. <i>He <b>puke</b>d up his pizza.</i>
<b>purge</b>	Eject the contents of the stomach through the mouth. <i>Bob had helped <b>purge</b> Martha of the terrible guilt that had haunted her.</i>
<b>regorge</b>	Bring up again; disgorge. <i>The least east wind makes their waters <b>regorge</b> and overspread a vast extent of level ground.</i>
<b>regurgitate</b>	Feed through the beak by regurgitating previously swallowed food. <i>The patient <b>regurgitated</b> the food we gave him last night.</i>
<b>retch</b>	Vomit. <i>The sour taste in her mouth made her <b>retch</b>.</i>
<b>rush</b>	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>To <b>rush</b> the bank and fire willy nilly could be disastrous for everyone.</i>
<b>sick</b>	Eject the contents of the stomach through the mouth. <i>He was passing blood and <b>sicking</b> it up.</i>
<b>spew out</b>	Expel or eject (saliva or phlegm or sputum) from the mouth.
<b>spew up</b>	Expel or eject (saliva or phlegm or sputum) from the mouth.

- spit** Light rain falls.  
*He was **spitting** with sudden fury.*
- spout** (of a liquid) flow out forcibly in a stream.  
*He was **spouting** platitudes about our furry friends.*
- spue** Expel or eject (saliva or phlegm or sputum) from the mouth.
- spurt** Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet.  
*He cut his finger and blood **spurred** over the sliced potatoes.*
- surge** (of a crowd or a natural force) move suddenly and powerfully forward or upward.  
*The army **surged** forward.*
- throw up** Cause to be confused emotionally.
- upchuck** Vomit.  
*I almost **upchucked** my toasted marshmallows.*
- vomit up** Eject the contents of the stomach through the mouth.

- *Buses were spewing out black clouds of exhaust.*
- *Great screeds of paper spewed out of the computer.*
- *He felt faint and nauseous—he had to get out before he spewed.*
- *The volcano spews out molten rocks every day.*

## Associations of "Spew" (30 Words)

<b>beep</b>	Call summon or alert with a beeper. <i>The machines were <b>beeping</b> and the tills humming.</i>
<b>bile</b>	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder; aids in the digestion of fats. <i>His response was full of <b>bile</b> and hatred.</i>
<b>bilious</b>	Affected by or associated with nausea or vomiting. <i>A <b>bilious</b> yellow hue.</i>
<b>blare</b>	A loud, harsh sound. <i>A <b>blare</b> of trumpets.</i>
<b>chuck</b>	The part of a forequarter from the neck to the ribs and including the shoulder blade. <i>She kept the personal bits and pieces and <b>chucked</b> the rest.</i>
<b>diarrhea</b>	Frequent and watery bowel movements; can be a symptom of infection or food poisoning or colitis or a gastrointestinal tumor.
<b>disgorge</b>	Yield or give up (funds, especially when dishonestly acquired). <i>The combine <b>disgorged</b> a steady stream of grain.</i>
<b>dribble</b>	Allow saliva to run from the mouth. <i><b>Dribble</b> oil into the mixture.</i>
<b>drip</b>	A method of brewing coffee by dripping boiling water through a filter filled with ground coffee beans. <i>Water <b>dripped</b> from her clothing.</i>
<b>drivel</b>	Let saliva drivel from the mouth. <i>The nurse leaves you to <b>drivel</b> and never wipes your nose.</i>
<b>dyspeptic</b>	Having indigestion or a consequent air of irritable bad temper.
<b>emetic</b>	Nauseating or revolting. <i>That <b>emetic</b> music endemic to department stores.</i>
<b>gland</b>	A structure resembling a gland especially a lymph node. <i>Symptoms include swollen <b>glands</b>.</i>
<b>honk</b>	Make or cause to make a honk. <i>Fans <b>honked</b> their horns.</i>
<b>mucous</b>	Relating to, producing, covered with, or of the nature of mucus. <i><b>Mucous</b> tissue.</i>

<b>mucus</b>	Protective secretion of the mucus membranes in the gut it lubricates the passage of food and protects the epithelial cells in the nose and throat and lungs it can make it difficult for bacteria to penetrate the body through the epithe.
<b>perspiration</b>	The process of sweating. <i>Exercise causes <b>perspiration</b> and a speeded up heartbeat.</i>
<b>perspire</b>	Excrete perspiration through the pores in the skin. <i>Will was perspiring heavily.</i>
<b>repulse</b>	A discouraging response to an offer or approach. <i>Rioters tried to storm the Ministry but were <b>repulsed</b> by police.</i>
<b>response</b>	A reaction to something. <i>We unwittingly induce Pavlovian type <b>responses</b> in dogs by establishing a rigid routine for feeding.</i>
<b>retch</b>	Make the sound and movement of vomiting. <i>With a sudden <b>retch</b> he vomited all over the floor.</i>
<b>saliva</b>	A clear liquid secreted into the mouth by the salivary glands and mucous glands of the mouth moistens the mouth and starts the digestion of starches.
<b>salivary</b>	Relating to or secreting saliva. <i>The <b>salivary</b> glands.</i>
<b>secretion</b>	A substance discharged by secretion. <i>Hormonal <b>secretions</b>.</i>
<b>spill</b>	A quantity of liquid that has spilled or been spilt. <i>He was absolved from any blame for the oil <b>spill</b>.</i>
<b>spit</b>	The act of spitting forcefully expelling saliva. <i>It began to <b>spit</b>.</i>
<b>sputum</b>	A mixture of saliva and mucus coughed up from the respiratory tract, typically as a result of infection or other disease and often examined microscopically to aid medical diagnosis.
<b>sweat</b>	Exude sweat. <i>Beads of <b>sweat</b> broke out on her brow.</i>
<b>toot</b>	Make a toot. <i>An accidental <b>toot</b> from the saxophonist.</i>
