<b>hate</b>	An intensely disliked person or thing. <i>Feelings of <b>hate</b> and revenge.</i>
<b>hatred</b>	Intense dislike; hate. <i>Racial <b>hatred</b>.</i>

<b>hostility</b>	The feeling of a hostile person. <i>He could no longer contain his <b>hostility</b>.</i>
<b>ill feeling</b>	An often persistent bodily disorder or disease; a cause for complaining.
<b>ill will</b>	An often persistent bodily disorder or disease; a cause for complaining.
<b>malevolence</b>	The quality of threatening evil. <i>His eyes were glowing with <b>malevolence</b>.</i>
<b>malice</b>	Wrongful intention, especially as increasing the guilt of certain offences. <i>I bear no <b>malice</b> towards anybody.</i>
<b>maliciousness</b>	Feeling a need to see others suffer.
<b>malignance</b>	The quality of being malign. <i>A spirit of pure unadulterated <b>malignance</b> towards the world.</i>
<b>malignity</b>	Wishing evil to others.
<b>nastiness</b>	The state or quality of being nasty. <i>I flinched at the <b>nastiness</b> of his wound.</i>
<b>rancour</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will. <i>He spoke without <b>rancour</b>.</i>
<b>resentment</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will. <i>His <b>resentment</b> at being demoted.</i>
<b>spitefulness</b>	Feeling a need to see others suffer.
<b>spleen</b>	A large dark-red oval organ on the left side of the body between the stomach and the diaphragm; produces cells involved in immune responses. <i>He could vent his <b>spleen</b> on the institutions which had duped him.</i>
<b>vengeance</b>	Punishment inflicted or retribution exacted for an injury or wrong. <i>For <b>vengeance</b> I would do nothing This nation is too great to look for mere revenge.</i>
<b>vengefulness</b>	A malevolent desire for revenge.
<b>venom</b>	A poisonous substance secreted by animals such as snakes, spiders, and scorpions and typically injected into prey or aggressors by biting or stinging. <i>Her true <b>venom</b> seems reserved for the media itself.</i>
<b>vindictiveness</b>	A malevolent desire for revenge.

**bruise** Cause a bruise or bruises to appear on a fruit vegetable or plant.  
*I will admit that my pride was **bruised** by his comment.*

<b>distress</b>	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>The manner in which leather jackets are industrially <b>distressed</b>.</i>
<b>hurt</b>	Hurt the feelings of. <i>Were you <b>hurting</b> after the accident.</i>
<b>injure</b>	Do injustice or wrong to (someone). <i>A libel calculated to <b>injure</b> the company's reputation.</i>

<b>resentment</b>	Bitter indignation at having been treated unfairly. <i>His <b>resentment</b> at being demoted.</i>
<b>retaliate</b>	Take revenge for a perceived wrong. <i>They used their abilities to <b>retaliate</b> the injury.</i>
<b>retaliation</b>	The action of returning a military attack; counter-attack. <i>The bombings are believed to be in <b>retaliation</b> for the trial of 15 suspects.</i>
<b>retribution</b>	The act of correcting for your wrongdoing. <i>Divine <b>retribution</b>.</i>
<b>revenge</b>	Inflict revenge on behalf of someone else. <i>Zimbabwe snatched the game 18 16 but the Spanish had their <b>revenge</b> later.</i>
<b>swear</b>	An offensive word used especially to express anger a swear word. <i>They were reluctant to <b>swear</b> allegiance.</i>
<b>vendetta</b>	A blood feud in which the family of a murdered person seeks vengeance on the murderer or the murderer's family. <i>He has accused the British media of pursuing a <b>vendetta</b> against him.</i>
<b>vengeance</b>	The act of taking revenge (harming someone in retaliation for something harmful that they have done) especially in the next life-Romans 12:19. <i>He swore <b>vengeance</b> on the man who betrayed him.</i>

<u>vengeful</u>	Disposed to seek revenge or intended for revenge- Shakespeare- M.R.Cohen. <i>A <b>vengeful</b> ex con.</i>
<b>venom</b>	Extreme malice and bitterness shown in someone's attitudes, speech, or actions. <i>Her true <b>venom</b> seems reserved for the media itself.</i>
<u>vindictive</u>	Showing malicious ill will and a desire to hurt; motivated by spite. <i>The criticism was both <b>vindictive</b> and personalized.</i>
<b>wickedness</b>	Estrangement from god. <i>The <b>wickedness</b> of the regime.</i>
<b>wreak</b>	Cause (a large amount of damage or harm). <i>The environmental damage <b>wreaked</b> by ninety years of phosphate mining.</i>
