- *A person who pledges to donate a certain amount of money to another person after they have participated in a fundraising event organized on behalf of a charity.*
- *Someone who supports or champions something.*
- *A person taking official responsibility for the actions of another.*
- *A person or organization that pays for or contributes to the costs involved in staging a sporting or artistic event in return for advertising.*
- *A person who introduces and supports a proposal for legislation.*

<b>helper</b>	A person who helps someone else. <i>We rely on volunteer <b>helpers</b>.</i>
<b>humanitarian</b>	A person who seeks to promote human welfare.
<b>patron</b>	The proprietor of an inn. <i>We surveyed the plushness of the hotel and its sleek well dressed <b>patrons</b>.</i>
<b>patroness</b>	A female patron.
<b>presenter</b>	A person who formally presents an award or honour to someone. <i>Jennifer Lopez was a <b>presenter</b> at the Hollywood Film Awards last night and had the honor of presenting the award for Best Animation.</i>
<b>promoter</b>	Someone who is an active supporter and advocate. <i>Mitterrand was a fierce <b>promoter</b> of European integration.</i>
<b>subscriber</b>	A person who receives a publication regularly by paying in advance. <i>The company has 2 6 million <b>subscribers</b> to its digital service.</i>
<b>subsidizer</b>	Someone who assists or supports by giving a subsidy.
<b>supporter</b>	A support for the genitals worn by men engaging in strenuous exercise. <i>All their <b>supporters</b> came out for the game.</i>

A major **underwriter** of the project.

*The land had lost its capacity to **support** life.*
- take someone's part** Take as an undesirable consequence of some event or state of affairs.
- take up the cudgels for** Lay claim to; as of an idea.
- underwrite** Sign and accept liability under (an insurance policy), thus guaranteeing payment in case loss or damage occurs.  
*They were willing to **underwrite** in part the construction of a ship.*
- uphold** Keep or maintain in unaltered condition; cause to remain or last.  
*They **uphold** a tradition of not causing distress to living creatures.*

<b>newlywed</b>	Someone recently married.
<u>partner</u>	Provide with a partner. <i>She lived with her <b>partner</b>.</i>
<b>patron</b>	A person or institution with the right to grant a benefice to a member of the clergy. <i>We surveyed the plushness of the hotel and its sleek well dressed <b>patrons</b>.</i>
<u>patronage</u>	The act of providing approval and support. <i>Even before noon there was a considerable <b>patronage</b>.</i>

<b>patronize</b>	Treat condescendingly. <i>Restaurants and bars regularly <b>patronized</b> by the stars were often crowded with paparazzi.</i>
<b>philanthropy</b>	The desire to promote the welfare of others, expressed especially by the generous donation of money to good causes. <i>He acquired a considerable fortune and was noted for his <b>philanthropy</b>.</i>
<b>polygamy</b>	The condition or practice of having more than one spouse at a time.
<b>proponent</b>	A person who advocates a theory, proposal, or course of action. <i>A strong <b>proponent</b> of the free market and liberal trade policies.</i>
<b>spouse</b>	A person's partner in marriage.
<b>suitor</b>	A man who pursues a relationship with a particular woman, with a view to marriage. <i>The company agreed to negotiate with its <b>suitor</b>.</i>
