- accidental** Not of prime or central importance.  
*The damage might have been **accidental**.*
- act** Take action do something.  
*The nanny **acted** quickly by grabbing the toddler and covering him with a wet towel.*
- adventitious** Happening as a result of an external factor or chance rather than design or inherent nature.  
***Adventitious** lobes may appear between the primaries.*
- automatic** A mode of operation in which a particular function of a piece of equipment is performed automatically rather than manually.  
*He received an **automatic** one match suspension.*
- discretionary** (especially of funds) not earmarked; available for use as needed.  
*There has been an increase in year end **discretionary** bonuses.*

<b>extemporize</b>	Manage in a makeshift way; do with whatever is at hand. <i>He <b>extemporized</b> at the piano.</i>
<b>fitful</b>	Occurring in spells and often abruptly. <i><b>Fitful</b> bursts of energy.</i>
<b>fresh</b>	(of a person) attractively youthful and unspoilt. <i>She shivered in the chilly air A bit <b>fresh</b> isn't it.</i>
<b>freshly</b>	Newly; recently. <i><b>Freshly</b> ground black pepper.</i>
<b>freshness</b>	Originality by virtue of being refreshingly novel. <i>She loved the <b>freshness</b> of newly baked bread.</i>
<b><u>impromptu</u></b>	Without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. <i>He spoke <b>impromptu</b>.</i>
<b>improvisation</b>	A creation spoken or written or composed extemporaneously (without prior preparation). <i><b>Improvisation</b> is a performer's greatest creative act.</i>
<b>improvised</b>	Done or made using whatever is available; makeshift. <i>We slept on <b>improvised</b> beds.</i>
<b>innocence</b>	The state, quality, or fact of being innocent of a crime or offence. <i>They must prove their <b>innocence</b>.</i>
<b>instinctive</b>	Relating to or prompted by instinct; done without conscious thought. <i>Offering to help was as <b>instinctive</b> as breathing.</i>
<b><u>intention</u></b>	An anticipated outcome that is intended or that guides your planned actions. <i>If his <b>intentions</b> aren't honourable I never want to see him again.</i>
<b><u>involuntary</u></b>	Done without will or conscious control. <i>A policy of <b>involuntary</b> repatriation.</i>
<b>jazz</b>	A style of theatrical dance performed to jazz or popular music. <i>Don't give me any of that <b>jazz</b>.</i>
<b><u>makeshift</u></b>	A temporary substitute or device. <i>The rock served as a <b>makeshift</b> hammer.</i>
<b>musical</b>	Characterized by or capable of producing music. <i>They burst out into rich <b>musical</b> laughter.</i>
<b>natural</b>	Relating to earthly human or physical nature as distinct from the spiritual or supernatural realm. <i>A <b>natural</b> pearl.</i>
<b>naturalness</b>	The quality or state of being natural. <i>He accepted the <b>naturalness</b> of death.</i>

<b>participation</b>	The condition of sharing in common with others (as fellows or partners etc. <b>Participation</b> in chapel activities.
<b><u>spontaneous</u></b>	Performed or occurring as a result of a sudden impulse or inclination and without premeditation or external stimulus. <b>Spontaneous</b> miscarriages.
<b>spontaneously</b>	Without apparent external cause or stimulus. A surprising number of early pregnancies <b>spontaneously</b> abort.
<b><u>uninhibited</u></b>	Not inhibited or restrained. Fits of <b>uninhibited</b> laughter.
<b>unreserved</b>	Frank and open. <b>Unreserved</b> grandstand seats.
<b>volitional</b>	With deliberate intention. A <b>volitional</b> act.
<b><u>voluntary</u></b>	Under the conscious control of the brain. <b>Voluntary</b> manslaughter.
<b><u>volunteer</u></b>	Do volunteer work. She <b>volunteered</b> to drive the old lady home.
