- accidental** Not of prime or central importance.
*The damage might have been **accidental**.*
- act** Take action do something.
*The nanny **acted** quickly by grabbing the toddler and covering him with a wet towel.*
- adventitious** Happening as a result of an external factor or chance rather than design or inherent nature.
***Adventitious** lobes may appear between the primaries.*
- automatic** A mode of operation in which a particular function of a piece of equipment is performed automatically rather than manually.
*He received an **automatic** one match suspension.*
- discretionary** (especially of funds) not earmarked; available for use as needed.
*There has been an increase in year end **discretionary** bonuses.*

extemporize	Manage in a makeshift way; do with whatever is at hand. <i>He extemporized at the piano.</i>
fitful	Occurring in spells and often abruptly. <i>Fitful bursts of energy.</i>
fresh	(of a person) attractively youthful and unspoilt. <i>She shivered in the chilly air A bit fresh isn't it.</i>
freshly	Newly; recently. <i>Freshly ground black pepper.</i>
freshness	Originality by virtue of being refreshingly novel. <i>She loved the freshness of newly baked bread.</i>
<u>impromptu</u>	Without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. <i>He spoke impromptu.</i>
improvisation	A creation spoken or written or composed extemporaneously (without prior preparation). <i>Improvisation is a performer's greatest creative act.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available; makeshift. <i>We slept on improvised beds.</i>
innocence	The state, quality, or fact of being innocent of a crime or offence. <i>They must prove their innocence.</i>
instinctive	Relating to or prompted by instinct; done without conscious thought. <i>Offering to help was as instinctive as breathing.</i>
<u>intention</u>	An anticipated outcome that is intended or that guides your planned actions. <i>If his intentions aren't honourable I never want to see him again.</i>
<u>involuntary</u>	Done without will or conscious control. <i>A policy of involuntary repatriation.</i>
jazz	A style of theatrical dance performed to jazz or popular music. <i>Don't give me any of that jazz.</i>
<u>makeshift</u>	A temporary substitute or device. <i>The rock served as a makeshift hammer.</i>
musical	Characterized by or capable of producing music. <i>They burst out into rich musical laughter.</i>
natural	Relating to earthly human or physical nature as distinct from the spiritual or supernatural realm. <i>A natural pearl.</i>
naturalness	The quality or state of being natural. <i>He accepted the naturalness of death.</i>

participation	The condition of sharing in common with others (as fellows or partners etc. Participation in chapel activities.
<u>spontaneous</u>	Performed or occurring as a result of a sudden impulse or inclination and without premeditation or external stimulus. Spontaneous miscarriages.
spontaneously	Without apparent external cause or stimulus. A surprising number of early pregnancies spontaneously abort.
<u>uninhibited</u>	Not inhibited or restrained. Fits of uninhibited laughter.
unreserved	Frank and open. Unreserved grandstand seats.
volitional	With deliberate intention. A volitional act.
<u>voluntary</u>	Under the conscious control of the brain. Voluntary manslaughter.
<u>volunteer</u>	Do volunteer work. She volunteered to drive the old lady home.
