
### **Spontaneous as an Adjective**

#### Definitions of "Spontaneous" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "spontaneous" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Having an open, natural, and uninhibited manner.
- Said or done without having been planned or written in advance.
- Happening or arising without apparent external cause.
- (of movement or activity in an organism) instinctive or involuntary.
- Performed or occurring as a result of a sudden impulse or inclination and without premeditation or external stimulus.
- (of a plant) growing naturally and without being tended or cultivated.
- (of a process or event) occurring without apparent external cause.

Said or done without having been planned or written in advance.
(especially of a legal sanction) given or imposed as a necessary and inevitable result of a fixed rule or particular set of circumstances. A budget deficit that caused <b>automatic</b> spending cuts.

Spoken or done without preparation. An <b>extemporaneous</b> speech.

<u>impromptu</u>	Done without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. An <b>impromptu</b> press conference.
impulsive	Having the power of driving or impelling. <i>The approaching waves contain an <b>impulsive</b> component.</i>
instinctive	Unthinking; prompted by (or as if by) instinct. An <b>instinctive</b> distaste for conflict.
instinctual	Relating to or denoting an innate, typically fixed pattern of behaviour; based on instinct. An <b>instinctual</b> survival response.
<u>involuntary</u>	Not subject to the control of the will- John F.Kennedy. It becoming a hero was <b>involuntary</b> They sank my boat.
natural	Relating to earthly human or physical nature as distinct from the spiritual or supernatural realm. The bassoon plays G <b>natural</b> instead of A flat.
reflex	(of an action) performed without conscious thought as an automatic response to a stimulus. A <b>reflex</b> knee jerk.
relaxed	Without strain or anxiety. Gave the impression of being quite <b>relaxed</b> .
self-generated	Originating from the self.
spur-of-the-moment	In response to an unforeseen need.
<u>unaffected</u>	Free of artificiality; sincere and genuine. The walks are suitable only for people who are <b>unaffected</b> by vertigo.
unbidden	Without having been commanded or invited. <b>Unbidden</b> tears came to his eyes.
<u>unconscious</u>	Not conscious; lacking awareness and the capacity for sensory perception as if asleep or dead. <i>He would wipe back his hair in an <b>unconscious</b> gesture of annoyance.</i>
unconstrained	Free from constraint. The dog was <b>unconstrained</b> .
unforced	Not compelled or constrained. An <b>unforced</b> cheerfulness.
<u>uninhibited</u>	Expressing one's feelings or thoughts unselfconsciously and without restraint. <b>Uninhibited</b> exuberance.



<u>unplanned</u>	Not done with purpose or intent. An <b>unplanned</b> economy.
unpremeditated	(of an act, remark, or state) not thought out or planned beforehand. <i>Asked an <b>unpremeditated</b> question.</i>
unprompted	Said, done, or acting without being encouraged or assisted. An <b>unprompted</b> apology.
unrehearsed	Not practised before a performance. Spontaneous and <b>unrehearsed</b> music.
unselfconscious	Not self-conscious. His behaviour was natural and <b>unselfconscious</b> .
unsolicited	Not requested or sought. <b>Unsolicited</b> junk mail.
unstudied	Lacking knowledge gained by study often in a particular field. Is <b>unstudied</b> in Latin as he is in may other matters.
unthinking	Not exhibiting or characterized by careful thought. She was at pains to correct <b>unthinking</b> prejudices.
unwritten	Not recorded in writing. The <b>unwritten</b> rules of social life.
<u>voluntary</u>	(of a conveyance or disposition) made without return in money or other consideration. <i>Voluntary motions.</i>

adventitious	Coming from outside; not native. They had to decide whether his misconduct was <b>adventitious</b> or the result of a flaw in his character.
<u>compose</u>	Produce a literary work. The first sentence is so hard to <b>compose</b> .
discretionary	Having or using the ability to act or decide according to your own discretion or judgment. <i>Discretionary funds.</i>
extemporaneous	With little or no preparation or forethought. An <b>extemporaneous</b> piano recital.



extempore	Without preparation. An <b>extempore</b> speech.
extemporize	Perform without preparation. He <b>extemporize</b> d a speech at the wedding.
fitful	Intermittently stopping and starting. <i>Business was <b>fitful</b>.</i>
freshness	The quality of being pleasantly new or different. The commentary should display <b>freshness</b> of insight.
immediate	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>The <b>immediate</b> result.</i>
<u>impromptu</u>	Without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. An <b>impromptu</b> speech.
improvisation	An unplanned expedient. <i>Improvisation</i> is a performer s greatest creative act.
<u>improvise</u>	Perform without preparation. After the hurricane destroyed our house we had to <b>improvise</b> for weeks.
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available. An <b>improvised</b> short speech.
<u>instant</u>	Instant coffee. An <b>instant</b> need.
instinctive	Relating to or prompted by instinct; done without conscious thought. An <b>instinctive</b> distaste for conflict.
intention	A thing intended; an aim or plan. His <b>intention</b> s are entirely honorable.
<u>makeshift</u>	Acting as an interim and temporary measure. The rock served as a <b>makeshift</b> hammer.
naturalness	The quality of innocent naivete. She demonstrates an ease and <b>naturalness</b> that many actors try hard to project.
offhand	Casually thoughtless or inconsiderate. Trying to sound <b>offhand</b> ed and reassuring.
<u>opportunist</u>	Opportunistic. Most burglaries are committed by casual <b>opportunist</b> s.
<u>reaction</u>	A force exerted in opposition to an applied force. <i>The law of action and <b>reaction</b></i> .
