
Definitions of "Spontaneous" as an adjective

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "spontaneous" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Having an open, natural, and uninhibited manner.
- Said or done without having been planned or written in advance.
- Happening or arising without apparent external cause.
- (of movement or activity in an organism) instinctive or involuntary.
- Performed or occurring as a result of a sudden impulse or inclination and without premeditation or external stimulus.
- (of a plant) growing naturally and without being tended or cultivated.
- (of a process or event) occurring without apparent external cause.
