diversify	Vary in order to spread risk or to expand. New plants will diversify the habitat.
effluence	A substance that flows out from something.
imbue	Fill soak or imbue totally. His works are invariably imbue d with a sense of calm and serenity.
intersperse	Introduce one's writing or speech with certain expressions. The debate was intersperse d with angry exchanges.
<u>permeate</u>	Spread throughout (something); pervade. Water permeate s sand easily.
<u>pervade</u>	Spread or diffuse through. A smell of stale cabbage pervade d the air.
pervasiveness	The quality of filling or spreading throughout. The pervasiveness of violence on television.
proliferate	Cause (cells, tissue, structures, etc.) to reproduce rapidly. <i>Electromagnetic radiation can only</i> proliferate <i>cancers already present.</i>
<u>proliferation</u>	A rapid increase in number (especially a rapid increase in the number of deadly weapons. <i>We attempted to measure cell proliferation.</i>
<u>propagate</u>	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. This great civilization was propagate d throughout the land.
<u>scatter</u>	The act of scattering. <i>Scatter</i> the coconut over the icing.
scattered	(of a person) distracted or disorganized. A scattered clifftop community.
<u>spray</u>	An act of spraying something. <i>Spray</i> water on someone.
spreading	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate.
strew	Spread by scattering (is archaic. A small room with newspapers strew n all over the floor.
suffuse	Cause to spread or flush or flood through, over, or across. The first half of the poem is suffuse d with idealism.
<u>unfold</u>	Spread out or open from a closed or folded state. There was a fascinating scene unfold ing before me.
