## Associations of "Spur of the moment" (30 Words)

<b>blink</b>	Try to control or prevent tears by blinking. <i>Out on the marshes there was a <b>blink</b> of light.</i>
<b>brief</b>	Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>A <b>brief</b> stay in the country.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Stimulate the development of (an activity, state, or belief). <i>The intention is to <b>encourage</b> new writing talent.</i>
<b>exigent</b>	Demanding attention. <i>Regarded literary questions as <b>exigent</b> and momentous.</i>
<b>extempore</b>	Without preparation. <i>He recited the poem <b>extempore</b>.</i>
<b>foment</b>	Bathe with warm water or medicated lotions. <i>They accused him of <b>fomenting</b> political unrest.</i>
<b>freshen</b>	Make fresh again. <i>The yachts picked up a <b>freshening</b> breeze.</i>
<b>grin</b>	Grimace grotesquely so as to reveal the teeth. <i>My word <b>grinned</b> the delighted man.</i>
<b>imminent</b>	Overhanging. <i>They were in <b>imminent</b> danger of being swept away.</i>
<b>improvised</b>	Created and performed spontaneously or without preparation; impromptu. <i>An <b>improvised</b> short speech.</i>
<b>impulsion</b>	A force that moves something along. <i>Attitudes changed under the <b>impulsion</b> of humanitarian considerations.</i>
<b>incite</b>	Encourage or stir up (violent or unlawful behaviour). <i>He <b>incited</b> loyal subjects to rebellion.</i>
<b>incitement</b>	An act of urging on or spurring on or rousing to action or instigating. <i>The <b>incitement</b> of mutiny.</i>

<b>inspire</b>	Supply the inspiration for. <i>The film was successful enough to <b>inspire</b> a sequel.</i>
<b><u>instant</u></b>	Instant coffee. <i>For an <b>instant</b> the moon disappeared.</i>
<b><u>instigate</u></b>	Provoke or stir up. <i>They <b>instigated</b> a reign of terror.</i>
<b><u>invoke</u></b>	Summon (a spirit) by charms or incantation. <i>She <b>invoked</b> an ancient law.</i>
<b>minute</b>	The distance covered in a minute by someone driving or walking. <i>It s been a <b>minute</b> since the pop singer has released new music.</i>
<b><u>motivate</u></b>	Provide (someone) with a reason for doing something. <i>He said he would <b>motivate</b> funds to upgrade the food stalls.</i>
<b>nadir</b>	The lowest or most unsuccessful point in a situation. <i>Asking that question was the <b>nadir</b> of my career.</i>
<b>offhand</b>	Without previous thought or consideration. <i>We decided <b>offhand</b> to go to Canada.</i>
<b><u>provoke</u></b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>Her behavior <b>provoked</b> a quarrel between the couple.</i>
<b>smile</b>	Express with a smile. <i>She <b>smiled</b> her thanks.</i>
<b><u>sparkling</u></b>	Lively and witty. <i><b>Sparkling</b> snow.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Encourage development of or increased activity in (a state or process). <i>Coffee and tea <b>stimulate</b> me.</i>
<b>stir</b>	Stir feelings in. <i>Nothing <b>stirred</b> except the wind.</i>
<b>transitory</b>	Lasting a very short time. <i><b>Transitory</b> periods of medieval greatness.</i>
<b><u>twinkling</u></b>	Shining intermittently with a sparkling light. <i><b>Twinkling</b> harbour lights.</i>
<b>urge</b>	Force or impel in an indicated direction. <i>He <b>urged</b> her to come and stay with us.</i>
<b><u>wink</u></b>	An act of winking. <i>She <b>winked</b> at him.</i>
