- *A person's circle of close friends.*
- *A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime.*
- *A smallest army unit.*
- *A small number of soldiers assembled for drill or assigned to a special task.*
- *A small group of people having a particular task.*

band	A group of musicians playing popular music for dancing. <i>A narrow band of gold was her only jewellery.</i>
battery	An assault in which the assailant makes physical contact. <i>Battery farming.</i>
body	The body excluding the head and neck and limbs. <i>It s important to keep your body in good condition.</i>
cadre	A group of activists in a communist or other revolutionary organization. <i>He was an activist in the cadre.</i>
clique	An exclusive circle of people with a common purpose. <i>His flat became a haven for a clique of young men of similar tastes.</i>

commando	A unit of commandos. <i>A commando attack.</i>
company	Organization of performers and associated personnel (especially theatrical). <i>I really enjoy his company.</i>
<u>coterie</u>	A small group of people with shared interests or tastes, especially one that is exclusive of other people. <i>A coterie of friends and advisers.</i>
<u>crew</u>	A group of people associated in some way. <i>The ship's captain and crew may be brought to trial.</i>
crowd	A large number of things or people considered together. <i>The crowd of tall buildings.</i>
detachment	A group of troops, aircraft, or ships sent away on a separate mission. <i>He felt a sense of detachment from what was going on.</i>
detail	A less significant item or fact. <i>We shall consider every detail of the Bill.</i>
force	The army navy and air force of a country. <i>They ruled by law and not by force.</i>
<u>gang</u>	An organized group of criminals. <i>The machine had a gang of cutter chains on a swivelling head.</i>
group	Two or more figures or objects forming a design. <i>I now belong to my local drama group.</i>
mob	The ordinary people. <i>My mob travelled and traded with other people.</i>
<u>outfit</u>	Any cohesive unit such as a military company. <i>Her wedding outfit.</i>
<u>patrol</u>	A detachment used for security or reconnaissance. <i>The police were on patrol when they were ordered to investigate the incident.</i>
platoon	Engaged in platooning. <i>Platoons of sharp lawyers.</i>
police squad	The force of policemen and officers.
ring	The sound of a bell ringing E A Poe. <i>A boxing ring.</i>
set	Evil Egyptian god with the head of a beast that has high square ears and a long snout; brother and murderer of Osiris. <i>His instructions deliberately gave them the wrong set.</i>

squadron	<p>A principal division of an armoured or cavalry regiment, consisting of two or more troops. <i>He immediately commissioned a squadron of architects.</i></p>
team	<p>Used before another word to form the name of a real or notional group which supports or favours the person or thing indicated. <i>Team members.</i></p>
troop	<p>Soldiers or armed forces. <i>A troop of children.</i></p>

Associations of "Squad" (30 Words)

<u>armored</u>	Protected by armor (used of persons or things military).
<u>army</u>	The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and trains soldiers for land warfare. <i>He joined the army at 16.</i>
artillery	Large-calibre guns used in warfare on land. <i>Each corps included two regiments of field artillery.</i>
battalion	A large organized group of people pursuing a common aim. <i>A battalion of ants.</i>
<u>brigade</u>	Form into a brigade. <i>The militia which was brigaded with regular formations to improve its training.</i>
<u>captain</u>	Be the captain of a ship aircraft or sports team. <i>He did very well academically becoming school captain.</i>

chieftain	The head of a tribe or clan. <i>An elite composed of corporate chieftains.</i>
colonel	A commissioned military officer in the United States Army or Air Force or Marines who ranks above a lieutenant colonel and below a brigadier general.
command	Be in command of. <i>This speaker commands a high fee.</i>
commander	A rank of naval officer above lieutenant commander and below captain. <i>The commander of a paratroop regiment.</i>
contingent	A group of people sharing a common feature, forming part of a larger group. <i>Arms sales contingent on the approval of congress.</i>
corps	A body of people associated together. <i>At 9 30 a m the press corps was handed what looked to be a routine list of orders.</i>
deployment	The action of bringing resources into effective action. <i>The authorities announced deployment of extra security forces in towns and cities to prevent violence.</i>
dragoon	A mounted infantryman armed with a carbine. <i>She had been dragooned into helping with the housework.</i>
garrison	Station troops in a fort or garrison. <i>Air reconnaissance showed the Germans had not garrisoned the island.</i>
grenadier	A common bottom-dwelling fish with a large head, a long tapering tail, and typically a luminous gland on the belly.
leader	A conductor of a small musical group. <i>The leader of a protest group.</i>
legion	A division of 3,000-6,000 men, including a complement of cavalry, in the ancient Roman army. <i>Her fans are legion.</i>
legionary	Of an ancient Roman legion. <i>The legionary fortress of Isca.</i>
master	Make a master copy of a film or recording. <i>A master of the violin.</i>
militia	Civilians trained as soldiers but not part of the regular army. <i>Small detachments of militia.</i>
naval	Relating to a navy or navies. <i>A naval base.</i>
officer	Direct or command as an officer. <i>A chief executive officer.</i>

regiment	Form military personnel into a regiment. Regiment soldiers.
sergeant	A rank of non commissioned officer in the army or air force above corporal and below staff sergeant.
skipper	Work as the skipper on a vessel. <i>The course teaches even complete beginners to skipper their own yachts.</i>
<u>soldier</u>	Serve as a soldier in the military. <i>Graham wasn't enjoying this but he soldiered on.</i>
subaltern	Inferior in rank or status. <i>The private tutor was a recognized subaltern part of the bourgeois family.</i>
team	Come together as a team to achieve a common goal. <i>The abbey's wagon and a team of horses are gone.</i>
troop	A group of soldiers. Troop cuts.
