Squatter as a Noun

Definitions of "Squatter" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “squatter” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A settler with no legal title to the land occupied, typically one on land not yet allocated by a government.*
- *A person occupying a tract of pastoral land as a tenant of the Crown.*
- *A large-scale sheep or cattle farmer.*
- *Someone who settles lawfully on government land with the intent to acquire title to it.*
- *A person who unlawfully occupies an uninhabited building or unused land.*
- *Someone who settles on land without right or title.*



Synonyms of "Squatter" as a noun (8 Words)

colonial	A house built in colonial style. <i>A rebellion by Dutch speaking colonials.</i>
colonizer	Someone who helps to found a colony. <i>Portugal was a major colonizer in both Brazil and parts of Africa.</i>
frontiersman	A man living in the region of a frontier, especially that between settled and unsettled country.
frontierswoman	A woman who lives on the frontier. <i>A frontierswoman who can shoot scuffle and spin tall tales.</i>
homesteader	Someone who settles lawfully on government land with the intent to acquire title to it.
nester	A bird that has built (or is building) a nest. <i>Hole nesters.</i>

pioneer

Someone who helps to open up a new line of research or technology or art.

*A famous **pioneer** of birth control.*

settler

A person who settles in a new colony or moves into new country.

*The early European **settlers** in America were often fleeing from religious persecution.*



Usage Examples of "Squatter" as a noun

- A squatter camp.
- The police moved in and evicted the squatters.
- One of the wealthiest and most prominent squatter families of northern Victoria.



Associations of "Squatter" (30 Words)

- abolitionism** The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
- acquit** Conduct oneself or perform in a specified way.
*The goalkeeper **acquitted** himself well.*
- autonomous** Not controlled by outside forces.
*Tests indicate that **autonomous** driving will cut fuel consumption by up to five per cent.*
- banish** Get rid of (something unwanted).
*He was **banished** from his own country.*

<u>colony</u>	<p>A group of people living in a colony consisting of the original settlers and their descendants and successors.</p> <p>A nudist colony.</p>
community	<p>A group of people living in a particular local area.</p> <p>The community of goods.</p>
cutout	<p>A photograph from which the background has been cut away.</p>
deport	<p>Expel from a country.</p> <p>He was deported to Turkey for his public condemnation of the Shah.</p>
discharge	<p>A substance that has been discharged.</p> <p>Referrals can be discussed before discharge from hospital.</p>
eject	<p>Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule.</p> <p>Plants utilize carbon dioxide in the atmosphere that animals eject.</p>
evict	<p>Expel or eject without recourse to legal process.</p> <p>The landlord wanted to evict the tenants so he banged on the pipes every morning at 3 a m.</p>
exculpate	<p>Pronounce not guilty of criminal charges.</p> <p>The article exculpated the mayor.</p>
<u>exonerate</u>	<p>(of an official body) absolve (someone) from blame for a fault or wrongdoing.</p> <p>Pope Clement V exonerated the king from his oath to the barons.</p>
<u>expel</u>	<p>Eliminate (a substance).</p> <p>She was expelled from school.</p>
<u>ghetto</u>	<p>An isolated or segregated group or area.</p> <p>The relative security of the gay ghetto.</p>
illegal	<p>A person living in a country without official authorization.</p> <p>An illegal chess move.</p>
importation	<p>The commercial activity of buying and bringing in goods from a foreign country.</p> <p>Manufacturers fought to restrict the importation of cheap foreign goods.</p>
informal	<p>Having or fostering a warm or friendly and informal atmosphere.</p> <p>An informal agreement.</p>
<u>kick</u>	<p>Chiefly in rugby a player of specified kicking ability.</p> <p>He suffered a kick on the pink in frame four.</p>

manumission	The formal act of freeing from slavery. <i>Manumission documents from the Slavery Chancellery.</i>
oust	Remove from a position or office. <i>The reformists were ousted from power.</i>
release	Release as from one's grip. <i>The release of iodine from the thyroid gland.</i>
smuggle	Convey (someone or something) somewhere secretly and illicitly. <i>He smuggled out a message.</i>
smuggling	The illegal movement of goods into or out of a country. <i>Cocaine smuggling has increased alarmingly.</i>
<u>unauthorized</u>	Not having official permission or approval. <i>An unauthorized strike.</i>
unconfirmed	Not finally established or settled. <i>An unconfirmed report of shots being fired.</i>
unlicensed	Lacking official approval. <i>Unlicensed weapons.</i>
<u>unofficial</u>	Not having official authority or sanction. <i>He participated in an unofficial capacity.</i>
