## Squatter as a Noun

### Definitions of "Squatter" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “squatter” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A settler with no legal title to the land occupied, typically one on land not yet allocated by a government.*
- *A person occupying a tract of pastoral land as a tenant of the Crown.*
- *A large-scale sheep or cattle farmer.*
- *Someone who settles lawfully on government land with the intent to acquire title to it.*
- *A person who unlawfully occupies an uninhabited building or unused land.*
- *Someone who settles on land without right or title.*



## Synonyms of "Squatter" as a noun (8 Words)

<b>colonial</b>	A house built in colonial style. <i>A rebellion by Dutch speaking <b>colonials</b>.</i>
<b>colonizer</b>	Someone who helps to found a colony. <i>Portugal was a major <b>colonizer</b> in both Brazil and parts of Africa.</i>
<b>frontiersman</b>	A man living in the region of a frontier, especially that between settled and unsettled country.
<b>frontierswoman</b>	A woman who lives on the frontier. <i>A <b>frontierswoman</b> who can shoot scuffle and spin tall tales.</i>
<b>homesteader</b>	Someone who settles lawfully on government land with the intent to acquire title to it.
<b>nester</b>	A bird that has built (or is building) a nest. <i>Hole <b>nesters</b>.</i>

**pioneer**

Someone who helps to open up a new line of research or technology or art.

*A famous **pioneer** of birth control.*

**settler**

A person who settles in a new colony or moves into new country.

*The early European **settlers** in America were often fleeing from religious persecution.*



## Usage Examples of "Squatter" as a noun

- *A squatter camp.*
- *The police moved in and evicted the squatters.*
- *One of the wealthiest and most prominent squatter families of northern Victoria.*



## Associations of "Squatter" (30 Words)

- abolitionism** The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
- acquit** Conduct oneself or perform in a specified way.  
*The goalkeeper **acquitted** himself well.*
- autonomous** Not controlled by outside forces.  
*Tests indicate that **autonomous** driving will cut fuel consumption by up to five per cent.*
- banish** Get rid of (something unwanted).  
*He was **banished** from his own country.*

<b>bootleg</b>	A play in which the quarterback pretends to hand the ball to a teammate but continues to carry it, concealing it from opposing players by holding it near his hip. <i><b>Bootleg</b> tapes of the diva s singing.</i>
<b>colony</b>	A group of people living in a colony consisting of the original settlers and their descendants and successors. <i>A nudist <b>colony</b>.</i>
<b>community</b>	A group of people living in a particular local area. <i>The <b>community</b> of goods.</i>
<b>cutout</b>	A photograph from which the background has been cut away.
<b>deport</b>	Expel from a country. <i>He was <b>deported</b> to Turkey for his public condemnation of the Shah.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	A substance that has been discharged. <i>Referrals can be discussed before <b>discharge</b> from hospital.</i>
<b>eject</b>	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>Plants utilize carbon dioxide in the atmosphere that animals <b>eject</b>.</i>
<b>evict</b>	Expel or eject without recourse to legal process. <i>The landlord wanted to <b>evict</b> the tenants so he banged on the pipes every morning at 3 a m.</i>
<b>exculpate</b>	Pronounce not guilty of criminal charges. <i>The article <b>exculpated</b> the mayor.</i>
<b>exonerate</b>	(of an official body) absolve (someone) from blame for a fault or wrongdoing. <i>Pope Clement V <b>exonerated</b> the king from his oath to the barons.</i>
<b>expel</b>	Eliminate (a substance). <i>She was <b>expelled</b> from school.</i>
<b>ghetto</b>	An isolated or segregated group or area. <i>The relative security of the gay <b>ghetto</b>.</i>
<b>illegal</b>	A person living in a country without official authorization. <i>An <b>illegal</b> chess move.</i>
<b>importation</b>	The commercial activity of buying and bringing in goods from a foreign country. <i>Manufacturers fought to restrict the <b>importation</b> of cheap foreign goods.</i>
<b>informal</b>	Having or fostering a warm or friendly and informal atmosphere. <i>An <b>informal</b> agreement.</i>
<b>kick</b>	Chiefly in rugby a player of specified kicking ability. <i>He suffered a <b>kick</b> on the pink in frame four.</i>

<b>manumission</b>	The formal act of freeing from slavery. <i><b>Manumission</b> documents from the Slavery Chancellery.</i>
<b>oust</b>	Remove from a position or office. <i>The reformists were <b>ousted</b> from power.</i>
<b>release</b>	Release as from one's grip. <i>The <b>release</b> of iodine from the thyroid gland.</i>
<b>smuggle</b>	Convey (someone or something) somewhere secretly and illicitly. <i>He <b>smuggled</b> out a message.</i>
<b>smuggling</b>	The illegal movement of goods into or out of a country. <i>Cocaine <b>smuggling</b> has increased alarmingly.</i>
<b><u>unauthorized</u></b>	Not having official permission or approval. <i>An <b>unauthorized</b> strike.</i>
<b>unconfirmed</b>	Not finally established or settled. <i>An <b>unconfirmed</b> report of shots being fired.</i>
<b>unlicensed</b>	Lacking official approval. <i><b>Unlicensed</b> weapons.</i>
<b><u>unofficial</u></b>	Not having official authority or sanction. <i>He participated in an <b>unofficial</b> capacity.</i>
