

force	Take by force. The back door of the bank was force d.
force one's way	Urge or force (a person) to an action; constrain or motivate.



gouge	Overcharge or swindle (someone. The channel had been gouge d out by the ebbing water.
<u>grasp</u>	Seize and hold firmly. Many companies grasp ed the opportunity to expand.
grip	To grip or seize as in a wrestling match. The country was grip ped by recession.
hale	To cause to do through pressure or necessity, by physical, moral or intellectual means.
hug	Fit closely or tightly. He hug ged his knees to his chest.
<u>jam</u>	Get stuck and immobilized. Four of us were jam med in one compartment.

tear from	Separate or cause to separate abruptly.


