| solidity | The quality of being solid and reliable financially or factually or morally. <i>The solidity of the evidence worked in his favor.</i> |
| soundness | The muscle tone of healthy tissue. <i>Mental and physical soundness.</i> |
| stableness | The quality or attribute of being firm and steadfast. |
| steadiness | The quality not shaking or moving. <i>The relative steadiness of prices during 2013 was an indication that the market was adequately supplied.</i> |
